PCC Foundation Announces Million Dollar Challenge

With \$300,000 raised and a \$1 million challenge grant in place, The Pratt Community College Foundation has launched a capital campaign to build a track and field complex.



"We are pleased to announce that the Foundation is working to secure funding for this important project," says Foundation Board and Campaign Committee Member Gregg Lesh of Wichita.

"The project will benefit not only the Community College, but Skyline and Pratt school students as well. We are excited to have a privately funded \$1 million challenge grant to help us reach our goal."

"This is a community project," says Pratt Community College President Dr. Michael Calvert. "The College does not have a track and field facility. Skyline school district has a highly inadequate track and field facility, and the Pratt School district has a track which does not allow them to host track meets. The track and field complex—built as a result of this capital campaign—will serve all three of these schools, and much like the Green Sports Complex, serve as an economic engine for the community."

"We are grateful for the planning that has taken place with the school districts, the City, and others," said Calvert.

The College Foundation is taking the lead on securing the funding for this project, but the facilities are designed to help the entire community. In addition to the local schools and PCC, the track will be available to host such events as AAU meets and Special Olympics and will also serve as a health and exercise venue for the public. The field inside the track will have an artificial surface that can be used by the PCC soccer teams, as well as City recreation programs and the general public. An artificial surface provides the flexibility for many options, including youth tournaments, which will complement other events at Green Sports Complex and will further strengthen the value of the sports complex in bringing visitors to Pratt.

Plans call for the track and field facility to be built east of the current Green Sports Complex located on the southeast side of Pratt.

Nursing Program Announces Approval to Admit Students for the 2018-2019 Term

The Pratt Community College Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) Program has been approved by the Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN) to allow enrollment for the 2018-2019 academic year.

In April of 2017 PCC put its ADN program on hold for one year to allow faculty the opportunity to conduct a complete transformative restructuring of the ADN program starting with the mission and concluding with sustainable and repeatable measures to help ensure a high quality program in the future. PCC was granted approval by KSBN on Mar. 29, to voluntarily cease admissions to the ADN Program for one academic year.

PCC nursing faculty and administration received the news that the ADN Program was approved to admit students just last week after a final review and meeting at the KSBN offices in Topeka. During that time PCC presented the restructured ADN curriculum and syllabi for all courses and case study examples compiled by nursing faculty Sandy Nissen and Sherry Ward. PCC administration and nursing staff also provided clearly defined, measurable, and assessable goals, objectives and benchmarks that were established and evaluated weekly, monthly, and quarterly to help ensure ADN faculty met administrative expectations.

PCC's Director of Nursing, Kim Hansen proposed to KSBN approval to admit 30 students for the ADN program to begin this Fall. She also announced the hiring of a new adjunct faculty member to the team, Tammy Barber. Barber will be teaching PN clinical for the Winfield campus.

Remarks from the KSBN were overall positive toward Hansen, the administration and the PCC Board of Trustees. They stated in a review after a February on-site visit to Pratt that they saw many strengths within the program including the support of administration and trustees and within the nursing department itself. They also praised the facilities at the Pratt campus nursing simulation room and the community clinical site which is located in Pratt Regional Medical Center.

Hansen says that in this last year the department staff have made many changes to not only the curriculum but also the way they test nursing students to prepare them for state licensing exams, and the admissions process.

"Our faculty have completely revised the curriculum for the ADN Program with the help of a grant hired development consultant," said Hansen. "We submitted a new proposed curriculum to the KSBN at our last visit along with



case study examples for cross evaluation."

PCC President, Dr. Michael Calvert says the he and the PCC family are all very excited to re-admit students to our ADN Program starting this fall.

"We consistently hear from our local and regional health care facilities that the need for quality nurses is high," said Calvert. "We appreciate the support of the KSBN, who certainly did their due diligence in this process. I would also like to thank the PCC Board of Trustees, the community, and the PCC faculty and staff for their unwavering support of our nursing programs. A special thank you to the PCC Nursing faculty and staff for their continued hard work in the quest to rebuild the quality of the ADN Program. We will build off the most recent NCLEX pass rates as a foundation and look forward to the future optimistically"

The KSBN does have recommendations for the program moving forward. They approved the Practical Nursing (PN) program for another 5 years given that they maintain their National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) pass rates which have been higher than required at 90.91 percent pass rate.

"We are extremely pleased to receive the five-year approval from KSBN for the PN Program," said Calvert. "The pass rates and outcomes have a long history of success and we are honored to receive the highest recommendation (5 year approval) from KSBN. Our faculty and staff continue to deliver high quality health care education."

The ADN NCLEX pass rates for last year are also up at 83.33 percent.

The ADN Program has one more step to complete now that KSBN has given their approval the Kansas Board of Regents will review the revised curriculum which is currently in process.

Elizabeth Bible

Elizabeth Bible began her journey at Pratt Community College as a student in the fall of 1954. She attended PCC until she graduated in 1956 with her Associate's Degree in Art and Business. At the time, she had no idea she would dedicate the next 50 years as an employee of the college.

Bible was hired in July of 1956 as an assistant to the Dean of Pratt Community College, who at the time was also the high school principal. She served as the Administrative Assistant to the President until her first retirement in 2003. She then worked part time as an Associate Director until she retired again in 2006.

During her 50 years as an employee, Bible saw many changes throughout the college, such as the location of the campus itself.

"When I started working at PCC, the juniors and seniors in high school and the junior college were all in the same building," said Bible. "We had a joint office. We were part of the public school system at that time."

PCC and the public school system remained in the same building until the two entities separated and developed their own school boards. Bible recalls the moment they split, which was when the Kansas Community College Act was enforced. PCC had to move to a new location after the split.

"We moved to an old grade school building as an interim, which is where the parking lot just east of the middle school is. It has since been torn down," said Bible.

While at the interim building, a bond issue for the new campus was passed, however not without trouble.

"They passed one bond issue, but there was a problem and there was a lawsuit brought," said Bible. "We had to do it all over again."

The second bond issued passed, and Bible recalls the current Benson

Education Center being built in 1968. Since then, there has been a lot of changes to the current campus, including the addition of residence halls and new buildings.

Along with the move to the current campus, perhaps the biggest change Bible had witnessed through her time at PCC was the change in technology. When she first started, most of her work was done via manual typewriters and duplication machines. By the time she retired, computers and copy machines were the norm.

"We were all eager to change as technology became more convenient to use," said Bible.

For the most part, she believes students throughout the years remained the same with their goals to better themselves by attending PCC. She does believe, however, that as the years went on, students began to mature much quicker. Students began to involve themselves in interests outside of their school and into the community.

"They do a lot of community service work we didn't do back when I was in school," said Bible. "I'm real proud of the young people today."

The biggest monumental occurrence during Bible's career was when the college obtained its dedication as a vocational school.

"In either 1984 or 1985, we went to Topeka and appeared before the Kansas State Board of Education," said Bible. "There were two busses of people that went to testify and to support our cause. There were people from businesses and individuals in the community that went."

Students carried petitions and took them back to their hometowns to have them signed.

"We had a huge stack of petitions and binders we took to Topeka, which was pretty impressive to the Kansas



State Board of Education," said Bible. "We were successful with that trip and everyone was really excited coming home."

In 2002, Bible was presented with the Professional Board Staff Member Award from the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT). Any board staff member, such as college or board secretaries in colleges governed by the ACCT, that showed exemplary service were eligible to receive the award. Nominees spanned across the nation making the award rather special to Bible and to PCC. When asked what made her successful in her position, she said that being informed and flexible are the main contributors

"I would not change anything about my years at PCC," said Bible. "For the most part, it was a very good 50 years. I can honestly say I loved my job and I still miss it some days, but I am enjoying retirement, too!"

Bible was an integral person in achieving the many triumphs and successes that make PCC the institution it is today. Pratt Community College would like to thank her for her time and effort in her 50 years of building futures.

Don Schwartz



"I think I made a mistake."

The first words Don Schwartz remembers telling his mother after he arrived in Pratt during the summer of 1966 were less than enthusiastic. Little did he know at the time, his upcoming journey through Pratt and Pratt Community College, known as Pratt Junior College at the time, would be one that would change his life forever.

Schwartz was a stellar high school football player in Pennsylvania with hopes and dreams to play Division I ball. At the time, he had only one obstacle stopping him from fulfilling that dream – English. The University of Pennsylvania, as well as a few other schools, had recruited him to play football but he was not accepted due to his SAT scores in English.

"They said I have to attend a junior college before I could attend," said Schwartz. "They had sent my name onto junior colleges to recruit me. I had probably five junior colleges from Kansas, as well as San Francisco, Texas, and Colorado recruiting me. A lot of junior colleges."

A phone call from the PCC football coach, Ray Fulton, eventually won Schwartz over.

"Coach told me, 'The people out here talk funny compared to you. We don't have any trees compared to where you are coming from. It's a real small town. There are more horses and cows than there are people.' He was being totally honest," said Schwartz.

After Fulton told him he would get a spot on a Division I university roster back east with hard work put in on both, the field and the classroom, Schwartz had made up his mind.

"I got off the phone and told my mom I am going to Pratt, Kansas," said Schwartz. "I got out the map and discovered it was a little town between Dodge City and Wichita. I had seen the movie, Gun Smoke. I knew about Dodge City. I knew Wichita. So I decided to come here."

With \$100 saved from a summer job and a suitcase full of clothes, Schwartz boarded a train in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania and 26 hours later, arrived in Pratt, Kansas.

"I got off the train at 3:30 a.m. in Pratt. I immediately thought, 'Oh my gosh. I think I made a mistake,'" said Schwartz. "There was a grasshopper on the glass that was bigger than our birds we have back home."

The next morning, Schwartz and a few other football players went down to the lobby at the Parrish Hotel to meet Fulton. He showed them the college, which was an old 1919 high school building across from the hotel. The postcard he was sent was an architectural photo of the current college as it is today.

"It was beautiful," said Schwartz. "I was told if I stayed for two years, I would attend classes in that building."

Schwartz remembers the college had no dorms at that time. Fulton took Schwartz into the school to meet his academic advisor, Ray McKinney.

"I told Mr. McKinney that I wanted to go to university back east when I am

done here," said Schwartz. "He told me, 'You take everything that I tell you. Don't argue with me. I will get you into one of those schools.' I told him, 'Sir, whatever you tell me to take, I will take it.'"

Schwartz took everything he was told to for the next two years. He played football during the 1966-1967 season and the team went on to win seven games with only two losses and one tie. A Sterling Bowl win concluded the season and the Pratt Junior College Beavers were ranked seventh in the nation.

After graduation, Schwartz transferred to Villanova University and was the first junior college athlete to be accepted. Every credit he had taken at Pratt Junior College had transferred in to the university. In fact, the transcript was the best the Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences had seen coming from a junior college.

"I was the first athlete they took from a junior college," said Schwartz. "They had another kid come in right after me. Twenty three credits after two years were all that transferred for him. Everything I had coming out of Pratt Community College transferred into Villanova."

PCC not only prepared Schwartz for the university academically, he also found success on the football field. The university knew him from high school and saw film, but they were impressed with the improvements he had made in the two years prior.

"We started football practice and the head coach asked me where I learned to play football like that," said Schwartz. "I told him, 'Sir, I played in the Kansas Jayhawk JuCo Conference and I played against the Coffeyville Red Ravens.' They were the National Junior College champions every year."

Schwartz attended Villanova for three years and married a Kansas girl who was anxious to get back to the small

town way of life. In 1976, he accepted a job at Liberty Middle School and worked there for five years before being hired as a recruiter at PCC in 1981.

"The President of PCC at the time, Norman Myers, stopped me at a high school basketball game and asked if I would like to come work at the college as a recruiter," said Schwartz. "He said, 'You went to school at Pratt. I know you believe in the place. I will give you a raise and your boss will be Mr. Ray McKinney.' I immediately told him I am coming."

With his previous academic advisor as his mentor, Schwartz led a very successful recruiting career.

"It was easy to recruit students and

convincing parents because I went to Pratt," said Schwartz. "I graduated from Pratt. I went on and was very successful at a major university that was real high academically. The parents liked that and sent their kids here."

In his 28 years as an employee, Schwartz served many roles within the college. He was a coach, the Director of Admissions, an athletic director, and he even taught a class or two. No matter which hat he wore, he continued doing what he enjoyed doing most – recruiting students.

"I told Ray one time, 'I can't believe you are paying me to do this. I love doing this job. I go find kids from schools and bring them on campus. I give them a tour. I am selling them something that

I believe in,'" said Schwartz.

Schwartz retired from the college in 2009. In 2015, he was inducted into the PCC Athletic Hall of Fame due to his successes as an athlete, coach, and athletic director.

When asked if he would change anything about his journey that took him to Pratt, where he once thought he had made a mistake after stepping off the train in 1966, Schwartz would not hesitate to say no.

"If Villanova offered me a scholarship right after high school back in 1966, knowing what I know now, I would tell them and any other Division I school, no," said Schwartz. "I am going to Pratt Junior College."

September 6, 1938, Pratt Junior College opened its doors as the 14th junior college created in Kansas. Pratt "Juco" welcomed 150 new students to its original campus located on 401 S Hamilton St. Eighty years later, Pratt Community College, is proud to have helped build the futures of thousands of students on-campus, online, at our Winfield and Wichita learning centers and through high school concurrent enrollment.

The mission of Pratt Community College is maximum student learning, individual and workforce development, high quality instruction and service, and community enrichment. PCC is proud to be a part of the community in Pratt, Kansas. With more than 80 years of history, PCC remains humbled to serve our community and students who come to build a foundation for their lives.

PCC Opens Enrollment For New Technical Program

Pratt Community College has announced a new program to begin in the fall of 2018.

The new program, Modern Distribution Sales & Management (MDSM) provides an exceptional opportunity for students to experience learning outside of the classroom as well as a paid internship. Students have an opportunity to earn an MSDM Certificate after one year, earn their AAS of MSDM Degree, or earn their AS Degree and transfer to a four year university for a BS in Industrial Distribution. The MDSM AAS degree and certificate completion pending approval by Kansas Board of Regents as of March 2018.

PCC's MDSM associate program is a combination of supply chain logistics, sales, information systems, finance, marketing, and procurement. MDSM professionals are hands-on workers who primarily operate as the sales and marketing arm for manufacturers of industrial products. Course offerings provide students with professional, technical, business, communication, and leadership competencies.

It is the goal of the institution and program to help students in the MDSM program gain hands-on experience with local businesses as well as offer them meaningful exposure to potential job opportunities within the county and state. The new curriculum will include real-world exposure to the industry by visiting companies on-site and participating in internships with program industry partners such as Stanion Wholesale Electric.



PCC EPT Department Holds Job Fair For Students and Employers

The Electrical Power Technology (EPT) Job Fair is an annual event held in the spring hosted by the department. EPT Faculty are able to showcase their Lineman class to prospective employers from the surrounding region. Each student has a chance to demonstrate their skills in climbing and working on electrical poles at the PCC EPT facility while they are being observed by prospective

Many of the students have made applications for Internships to these employers who use this event as a time to evaluate and compare their skills. There were approximately 12 electrical companies represented at the event who had a chance to speak with students after the demonstration about potential summer internship and career opportunities available.



Freshmen and sophomores both have the opportunity to meet with professionals. For most, this event secures a summer internship, a chance for the student to gain more real-world experience while classes are not in session over.

"We received a lot of positive feedback on this year's students," said Dave Campbell, EPT Instructor. "The blustery day we had for the event was unfortunate but did add a great sense of real working conditions to the students working aloft on the Poles. It was a Great Day overall for everyone."

PCC Winter Sports Student Athletes Named KJCCC All-Conference Teams

The Jayhawk Conference has announced the award winners for the 2017-18 winter sports. Several Pratt Community College student athletes were selected as some of the best athletes in the KJCCC.

Nick Lucas was selected to the second team KJCCC for wrestling. Lucas was an NJCAA national qualifier this past season at 165lbs. At nationals, Lucas was one round away from qualifying as a NJCAA all-american. Lucas finished his freshman season at PCC with a record of 15-4 with 10 pins and two tech falls.

Jaylon Wilson was selected as a men's basketball KJCCC all-conference honorable mention. The sophomore guard was an iron man for the Beavers this season averaging 31 minutes per game. Wilson shot 46 percent, 34 percent from beyond the three-point arch and 82 percent from the free throw line. Averaging 14 points per game, Wilson scored 443 points for the Blue and White. Wilson came down with 117 rebounds, had 67 assists and 34 steals.

Channa Parvin was selected as a KJCCC all-conference honorable mention in women's basketball. The sophomore guard averaged 24 minutes per game. Parvin shot 32 percent from the field, 34 percent from three-point range and 76 percent from the free throw line. This season Parvin scored 193 points. She also had 62 rebounds, 38 assists and 15 steals.

PCC Track and Field Compete in the Oklahoma Baptist University Open

Pratt Community College track and field traveled to Shawnee, Oklahoma to compete in the Oklahoma Baptist Open. The Beavers were one of the few NJCAA schools at the open and competed well against runners from the NCAA division II level through NAIA ranks.

On the women's side, Anysia Romain and Madeline Jacobsen led the Beavers in the 400m dash. Romain ran a 1:00.90 while Jacobsen trailed just behind at 1:01.72. Jacobsen also excelled in the 400m hurdles finishing with a time of 1:08.99. In the 100m dash Tavaija Bennet placed in the top 10 of a field of 24 runners with a time of 12.71. Cayla Smither took fourth in the triple jump with a jump of 10.09m.



For the men, Robert Maston finished second out of a field of 19 runners in the 400m dash with a time of 49.26. Jevony Murray and Dorson St. Phard took first and second in the 100m dash. Murray took first with a time of 10.83. St. Phard finished just behind Murray with a time of 10.84.

The Blue and White took three of the top five spots in the 200m dash. Murray led the way at 21.81 for second place. In fourth place was St. Phard at 22.12. Rounding out the top five was Maston finishing fifth with a time of 22.40.

Elijah Battle rounded out the top 10 in the 800m race with a time of 2:00.03. William Charles finished thirteenth in the 800m with a time of 2:00.57.

PCC track and field next compete in the Wichita KT Woodman Classic on April 13 and 14. Events start at 10 a.m. both days and will last through the day.

PCC Updates Sports Performance and Fitness Center

Pratt Community College is proud to announce the opening of the newly renovated and revitalized Sports Performance and Fitness Center. The weight room at PCC has had a few different floor plans here on the current campus. The lower level of the Riney Student Center has always been its home but it has spent time in both the north and south rooms of Riney. Those who used the equipment housed in the room, would have described it as sufficient to get basic strength training done, but it had definitely seen better days. There was also a genuine concern about improving the cardio equipment. Discussions have been ongoing for several years to design and implement plans to upgrade and add the kind of equipment which could be used by student-athletes, the general student population, faculty and staff.



The Sports Performance and Fitness Center boasts the utilization of both the north and south rooms in the lower level of the Riney Student Center. Advanced Exercise helped put together the plans and choose the equipment to outfit both rooms.

PCC Preident, Dr. Michael Calvert, says he is excited to see the updated fitness center.

“This newly remodeled facility will certainly aid in the training of student-athletes at PCC and should make positive impacts in the recruitment of new students to PCC,” said calvert. “The best part is that all students and PCC faculty and staff can use the new equipment. We are appreciative of the PCC Board of Trustees for their support and approval of the use of student fees to fund this much-needed project”.

The focus of the north room is the cardio equipment. It houses four treadmills, a stair climber, two ellipticals and both a recumbent and upright stationary bike. These items will allow our students, faculty and staff to have a place to improve their fitness and general wellness, in addition to decreasing stress. The room also houses a multifunctional fitness piece called the Synergy 360T. It has multiple chin up bar alignments, a land mine station, a set of TRX bands, an adjustable height step up platform, and an adjustable height dip handle. This set of stations allows users to be more creative with their workouts and execute some of the current fitness trend exercises. For those who prefer using dumbbells for their training, it holds a set of dumbbells ranging from 5lbs to 30lbs.

The south room is geared more towards strength and conditioning and the Olympic style lifting programs utilized by several of our athletic teams. This room houses six half racks which hold two Olympic power bars to allow two users to be at work at once on one rack. Each rack is outfitted with weight plates and bumper plates ranging from 2.5lbs to 45lbs, a multi-adjustable bench, a set of power blocks that range from 12.5lbs to 125lbs, a multi-height plyo box, a landmine attachment, a set of med balls, and a set of strength bands. The room also holds a dual-functional trainer with two cable pulley stations and a multi-adjustable bench allowing for a variety of functional training exercises. Additionally, there will be two TV's installed for instruction, visual aids, and athletic training program use.

Student workers will be on staff from 9a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday while classes are in session. They will be able to help people learn to operate the equipment and give some general descriptions for use. PCC offers a variety courses geared towards health and fitness including Yoga, Beginning and Advance Weightlifting, and Exercise Techniques. With the expansion of this facility there is a possibility of more courses being offered in the future.
