

Tyler offers a many studio classes including, Ceramics I & II, Painting, Drawing, and Digital Photography, as well as Art Appreciation. This semester the ceramics classes hosted visiting artist, Dylan Seeney. Seeney is a ceramics instructor at Heights High School in Wichita, Kansas. He is currently in the Master of Fine Arts program at Fort Hays State University. Seeney exhibited his art work in the Delmar Riney Art Gallery with a closing reception on April 12th. His exhibition was called Beyond the Board: Reflections of Personal Identity Through Clay, it explored Seeney's views on nature, spirituality, and skateboard culture and how the three intertwine. He also taught a workshop to the ceramic students, demonstrating personified animal masks.

There was a student and faculty showcase in the Delmar Art Gallery through April 22nd-26th. This included all students taking a studio class as well as Dallis. The students have been working so hard honing their skills to create wonderful works of art.

The projects the art students work on vary per class. The drawing and painting classes focus on studies to develop their understanding of two-dimensional perspective. The digital photography class takes a look at photography through a contemporary lens. Learning how to take photos through a cell phone and how to edit them to be exhibition ready. The ceramic classes focus on identity through clay. The students make work that they personally identify with, items that represent them.



WOO ANNUAL TRIP

The sophomore Wildlife Outfitting and Operations class, Guiding in the Outdoors completed their annual backcountry hunting trip. This year, the class chose to chase the Merriam's Wild Turkey in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

In class, students researched the 1.2 million acre National Forests, selecting camping grounds, researching possibly dangerous animals and electronic scouting potential turkey habitat. The students selected a very good area in the national forest and were on birds from day one. On the first day they were legally able to hunt, one of the students missed a bird and another student had one come into 20 yards, but the new growth pines were too thick to get a shot. After many miles and more close encounters, one of the students harvested a bird on day three. He was the only student to fill their tag on the trip.

The students did have some other highlights. Finding shed antlers, including a large elk shed, catching trout, and talking with a lot of other

hunters in the area.

This trip helps students learn a western style of hunting. They must learn how the out of state tag lottery works, purify their own drinking water, how to stay warm at night: it was in the 20s with rain or snow most nights, and how to pack for the backcountry.

FACULTY SPOTLIGHT



Dave "Kip" Chambers

Kip Chambers has been a PCC Biology Instructor for 21 years, he hails from Pratt, Kansas, and started teaching biology at PCC in 2003. Having earned a MS degree with a focus on Environmental Management from Pittsburg State University in 2002, he was notified of an available biology teaching role at the college by former instructor Mike Westerhaus. Applying for the position in late summer 2003, and later offered and aladly accepted the job.

What is your favorite part of your job?

"My favorite part of teaching at PCC is the students in the classroom. The energy and enthusiasm that students bring with them into the classroom rejuvenates me and reminds me of why I have chosen to stay in the field of education for almost 30 years. I believe education provides students with the opportunity to empower themselves in a way that will enable them to improve the quality of their lives and through that process make the world a better place.

Another part of teaching at PCC that I find truly rewarding is the my fellow instructors at PCC. We are very fortunate have a stable faculty with little turnover in our area of the college. Because of this, I have had the opportunity to get to know many of the other teachers very well. My fellow instructors are always willing to help lift me up when I am having a tough day and willing to offer a helping hand when it is needed."

What is the most challenging part of your job?

"In general, I believe one of the more challenging aspects of teaching at PCC is how to manage all the other responsibilities that come with teaching at Pratt Community College. Due to the size of the faculty at PCC, instructors have a myriad of other responsibilities that go along with their teaching load. At times these other responsibilities impact the amount of time instructors have to focus on developing curriculum, preparing for classes, grading and helping students. "

Before joining the PCC community, what was an unusual or interesting job/position you have had?

"I worked for the National Marine Fisheries Service in the Berring Sea before coming to PCC. During that time, I worked as an Observer on commercial fishing vessels. My responsibilities included documenting the total catch of targeted fish species, by-catch, and observing and recording vessel interactions with marine mammals and birds."

What do you like most about mentoring students?

"At a community college you usually only have an opportunity to work with students for 2 years. The thing that I enjoy most about mentoring students during the time they are at PCC is seeing the academic and personal growth that can occur during that relatively short period of time."

How do you like to spend your free time?

"I enjoy being outdoors and have a passion for nature. My favorite place to vacation is anywhere there is a clean, clear, cold flowing river with an opportunity to float, fish and swim."

What is the most helpful advice you have ever received and words of advice you give others?

"Take responsibility for your actions. You usually get back from life what you put out there. You are in charge of your emotions and the decisions you make, do not allow other people to dictate how you feel or respond to a situation.

Don't waste time, there is a limited amount of it. It is ok to look back and learn from the difficult situations that life hands out sometimes, but ultimately if you want to grow and find peace and happiness you must find it in yourself. Keep moving forward, appreciate and be where your feet are. Find your own happiness!"

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, honors those who died in U.S. service. Originating after the Civil War, it was officially proclaimed in 1868. Initially honoring Civil War soldiers, it expanded to all Americans who died in wars. The holiday is now observed on the last Monday in May, providing a three-day weekend.

In 1915, Moina Michael was inspired by "In Flanders Fields" to start wearing red poppies on Memorial Day to honor fallen soldiers. Madam Guerin from France later made artificial poppies to raise funds for war victims, spreading the tradition internationally. The VFW began selling poppies in 1922, with disabled veterans making them by 1924.

The significance of Memorial Day and its history would not be fully understood without acknowledging the creation of the "National Moment of Remembrance." This resolution was passed in December 2000, urging all Americans to take a moment at 3 p.m. local time to remember and show respect in their own way.

COLLEGE HEALTHINGS

Transition from being a PCC Student

Graduating from college is a significant achievement and transition. Recent college graduates experience changes in their daily environments, schedules, and may need to shift their mindset from student life to working adulthood or to a larger college or University. These adjustments can disrupt routines, so it's important to be patient while adapting to a new normal.

Moreover, establishing and maintaining social connections with friends and peers post-graduation can be more challenging. Expectations regarding the frequency of interactions and social circles may need adjustment.

Navigating the uncertainty of this new phase may evoke feelings of sadness or a mourning process for the college experience left behind. It's common to experience symptoms of depression, such as: Feelings of loneliness or sadness, Decreased motivation or difficulty completing tasks, Loss of interest in previously enjoyed activities, Disorganization or struggling to stay on track, A prevailing sense of hopelessness.

Seven Ways to Support Your Mental Health Post-graduation:

- Be mindful of available resources post-graduation
- Stay connected with friends and make new connections
- Plan ahead for managing stressors
- Learn about your state's insurance process
- Find local healthcare practitioners and mental health support
- Explore career opportunities or further education
- Create a daily schedule to work towards post-graduation goals.

Beavers Pick up Two More National Qualifiers at the Region VI Meet

The Pratt Community College track and field team hosted and competed in the NJCAA Region VI/KJCCC Outdoor Track and Field Championships on May 2-4 at the Bill Keller Family Sports Complex in Pratt, Kansas. The team finished with four top-five finishers and nine top-ten finishers. The men's team finished in eleventh place in the team standings while the women finished in twelfth place.

The meet started off with the men's decathlon with Aiden Skiles representing the Beavers. Skiles finished top five in four of the decathlon events. Overall Skiles finished ninth in the men's decathlon. Skiles throw in the javelin qualified him for the NJCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships in two weeks. In addition, Skiles competed in the regular javelin throw with a sixth-place finish.

On the men's side, Joseph Michel and Kareem Small both finished fourth and sixth respectively in the 100m dash final. Sebastion Gilbreath finished ninth in the 400m dash while both the 4x100m relay (Sapalo, Sawyers, Vann, Michel) and the 4x400m relay (Brooks-Davis, Amparan, Gilbreath, Baker) both finished in the top ten. The 4x400m relay team qualified for the NJCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships with a time of 3:14.76. In field events, Davion Smith finished sixth in the high jump; Mason Pfaff finished ninth in the pole vault while Dillon Pikes finished tenth in the long jump and eighth in the triple jump.

Finally, for the women, Serenity Jackson finished seventh in the 200m dash and third in the 400m dash. The women's 4x100m relay team consisting of Serenity Jackson, Tashia Bell, Naomi Vagher, and Mikayla Henry finished fourth with a time of 47.65.

Beavers Set For NJCAA Plains District Opening Round Series

The Pratt Community College baseball team wrapped up their 2024 regular season this past week with a four-game series against Seward County Community College. The Beavers won the second game of the series 10-3 but lost the series 3-1 against the Saints. Pratt finished their season with an overall record of 22-33 and a 7-25 conference record. They finished eighth in the Jayhawk West conference.

For the third straight season, the Beavers under the helm of head baseball coach Todd Reller have advanced to the opening round of the 2024 Plains District Baseball Tournament. The Beavers enter the tournament as the sixteenth seed and will face the first seeded Johnson County Community College in a three-game series starting on Thursday, May 9, in Overland Park, Kansas. The series will be a best of three with game two taking place on Friday, May 10, and if needed, game three taking place on Saturday, May 11. All three games will begin at 1:00 p.m.

The Johnson County Cavaliers are ranked No. two in the nation with a 46-10 overall record and a 28-4 conference



record. Johnson County's four conference losses came against Fort Scott, Allen County, Cowley, and Kansas City Kansas. The Beavers faced both Fort Scott and Allen County earlier in the season and split the series against Allen County and lost 3-1 against Fort Scott.
