Diana Mitzner Hired as Nursing Director

Pratt Community College announces the hiring of Diana Mitzner as the new Director of Nursing.

Mitzner, a Hutchinson, Kan. native graduated from Hutchinson High School received an Associates Degree in Nursing at the University of Arkansas, and from there worked towards a BSN from Southwestern College and also has an MSN for Nurse Educator from University of Phoenix.



Mitzner has been a nurse for more than 28 years with many of those years not only working as a bedside nurse in a critical care setting but as an educator as well. After graduating from Hutchinson High School, Mitzner, joined the Army reserves so she could become a nurse, more specifically a Clinical Nurse Specialist.

While working in Critical Care Mitzner says her area of expertise included caring for open heart surgeries, traumas, neuro surgeries, and any other type of critical surgical patients. Mitzner also helped establish an open heart surgery program, worked as a Stroke Coordinator, and as a charge nurse in all of these units over the years. She was a mentor to new graduates as well as new staff nurses coming into the ICU settings, orientated and trained them to the routines of the ICU. Mitzner is also involved in the National League of Nursing, American Association of Critical Care Nurses, and is currently studying to pursue a certification as a Certified Nurse Educator.

"Teaching has been something I have always loved to do," said Mitzner. "The reason I teach is because I love to see those students who think they can't accomplish anything, succeed."

As the Director of Nursing Mitzner will continue to successfully move the program forward. In the process of reaccreditation the PCC Nursing Program requires three consecutive years of NCLEX pass rates of 75 percent or higher. PCC nursing graduates who took the test in 2018 received a pass rate of 83.33 percent. As it stands now for 2019 graduated test takers the pass rate sits at 77 percent with two graduates who still need to take the test. As it stands now PCC will need these last two test takers to pass with at least a 75 percent and for that trend to continue with the 2020 graduates.

Mitzner says that she is confident in the Nursing Program and she wants to start this year fresh so that it will be one of the best years ever.

DC3 and PCC Partnership Powers EPT Program

Following the April meeting of the Dodge City Community College Board of Trustees in which the trustees voted unanimously to eliminate the college's Electrical Power Technology program, negotiations began between DC3 and Pratt Community College.

Dodge City Community College administration initiated discussions with officials from PCC administration and EPT faculty regarding assisting current DC3 EPT students to complete their remaining requirements for their certification or associate of applied science degree.

At Tuesday's regular monthly meeting, DC3 trustees again voted unanimously to accept a Memorandum of Understanding between the two schools which sets forth the parameters of the partnership.

According to the agreement between the two institutions, PCC and DC3 have entered into a three-year partnership to offer current student the opportunity to complete their requirements on-campus in Dodge City, as well as bringing in potential new students later.

DC3 will provide the facilities and equipment at the Benson campus. PCC will provide the instructors and curriculum, and ultimately award the certificate or degree. Students studying for an associate degree will enroll in DC3 academic classes in addition to Pratt's EPT courses, eventually transferring any academic credits to Pratt.

DC3 will receive payment for the academic courses, plus an annual remittance from PCC of \$12 per credit hour in a technology fee.

According to Dr. Jane Holwerda, vice president of academic affairs for DC3, the institution that actually confers the credential is not the important part. What matters is that students are well-served, while DC3 remains faithful to its mission of providing professional guidance and supportive services to enable students to achieve their educational goals.

"This has been a very positive, collaborative effort with another Kansas community college," Holwerda said. "Ultimately, our students will benefit greatly from this, regardless of who gets credit for their degree."

The PCC program averages about 70 students across all locations, according to PCC officials, making it the largest EPT program in the state. PCC, which has operated its lineman program for 36 years, also offers its lineman program at Coffeyville Community College.

A big advantage to partnering with Pratt is the solid connection to industry leaders.

PCC also partners with the city of Coffeyville, WSU Tech, Westar Energy, Oklahoma City Power & Light, and others. Their industry partners serve on the program's advisory board to inform curriculum and ensure processes are fully up to date.

Dave Campbell, who heads the PCC lineman program, is part of national industry advising boards, including the T&D Powerskills program – a major influencer for the lineman industry nationwide. PCC is the first EPT program in the state to offer certified drone training – the most recent technological advancement in the industry.

Michael Fitzpatrick, PCC vice president of instruction, said the PCC placement rate typically hovers around 96 percent. He said that it's quite common for students to complete a year of training, garner their certification, and get snatched up by eager employers.

Campbell has been prompted to expand the program's hiring fair because an ever-growing number of employers are seeking their students for high-wage, high-demand jobs.

"These are very good jobs," said Campbell. "It's not unheard of for students to be making 100 thousand dollars within five years."



PCC Opens South-Central Career Pathways Center in Attica to Benefit High School Students

Enrollment is now open for students interested in taking automotive classes in the new South-Central Career Pathways Center (SCCPC) located in Attica, Kan.

The SCCPC facility stemmed from a need for an automotive shop for high school students to utilize in the South-Central Kansas area. The shop saves students time and resources by having a facility in their area.

The High Schools partnering with PCC for this initiative are currently USD 254 (Medicine Lodge), USD 361 (Chaparral) and USD 511 (Attica).

Current high school students qualify for tuition paid for by the state through the Excel in CTE (Senate Bill 155) program. You can find out more about the initiative at prattcc.edu/SB155.

Classes offered for the Fall 2019 semester include Steering & Suspension I and Brakes I. Future semesters will offer Steering & Suspension II, Brakes II, Engine Performance I and II, and Electrical I and II. PCC's new automotive instructor, Daniel Meng, will teach all classes. Students will enroll in one class in the morning or in the afternoon, high school schedule permitting.

The shop has ASE Education Foundation national accreditation and prepares each student to obtain their ASE certifications.

Students can call 620-450-2217 to enroll in fall semester courses.

The Automotive Technology department at Pratt Community College works on an "experience the learning" concept. Automotive technology students work in a shop environment with state of the art equipment they will find in the auto industry. Students have the opportunity to earn an occupational certificate or an Associate of Applied Science degree. All these experiences prepare students to test to become ASE certified prior to graduation, enhancing the students' earning potential and career opportunities. PCC Men's Basketball Coach Sean Flynn Helps Work Tournament In Mexico

Pratt Community College men's basketball coach, Sean Flynn, represented PCC at Hoops on the Beach in Cancun, Mexico from June 13 to June 16. The Hoops on the Beach event is hosted by International Basketball Training, a player development company that works with athletes of all levels and ages. Flynn worked as an evaluator by watching approximately 30 games at the 15, 17, and 19 and under levels. Players at the event came from countries such as Belize, Panama, Mexico, Argentina, Dominican Republic, and Puerto Rico.

"I met amazing young people on this trip," said Flynn. "I grew enamored with the competitive spirit of both spectators and athletes."

Flynn noted that players at the event were very physical, but not dirty. In fact, outside of the gym kids sparred and played tackle football.

"Contact is embraced as a positive teaching tool (in the Cancun area)," said Flynn. "Good sportsmanship is mandatory."

At the end of the event, Flynn spoke with a team from Argentina. After his speech, the Argentinian coach invited him to run his clinics in Buenos Aires, Argentina at the end of July, which he will attend.

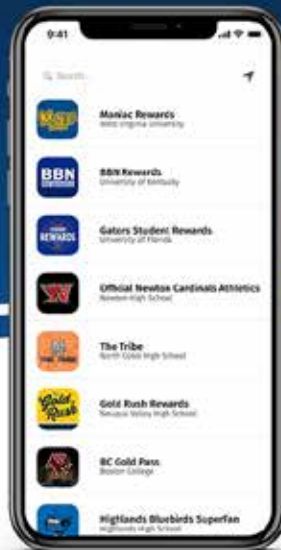

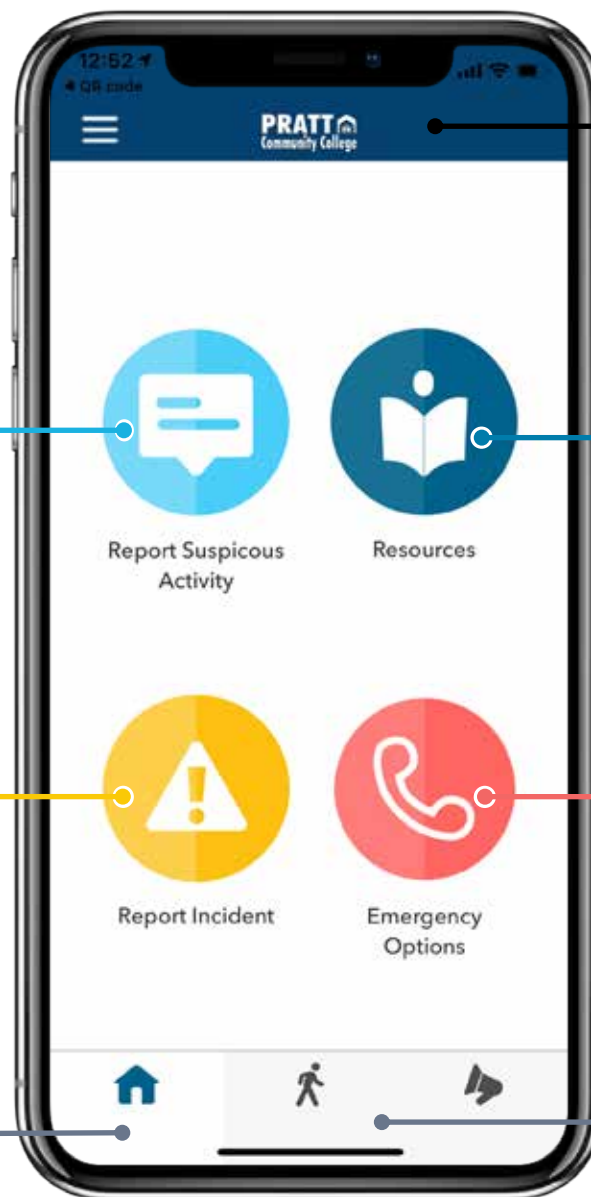
Share Info with Safety & Security
