The Higher Learning Commission recently announced the recognition of several HLC Peer Corp members for awards at the Peer Corps Luncheon held in March during the 2023 HLC annual conference and Peer Corps Program at the Hyatt Regency Chicago.

Lisa Perez-Miller, Vice President of Students and Enrollment Management at Pratt Community College was awarded the Essential Leader Award.

The Peer Corps awards are presented in recognition of exemplary volunteer service in areas key to HLC's success. Recipients of the Essential Leader Award are nominated and chosen by HLC staff. These reviewers have contributed significantly to the development

of a new program, training initiative or process function. They provide HLC with invaluable feedback and field-based perspectives that are crucial to the success of such projects.

HLC maintains a Peer Corps of approximately 1,600 faculty, administrators and staff who are currently employed by or recently retired from colleges and universities in the United States. Peer reviewers play an incredibly important role in all stages of the accreditation process. They are responsible for assuring that an institution is complying with the accreditation criteria as well as for helping an institution advance within the context of its own mission.

"HLC relies on the work of peer reviewers. They have an essential role in assuring the quality of our member institutions, and we thank them for all that they do daily," said Barbara Gellman-Danley, president of HLC.

Perez-Miller has been a member of the HLC Peer Corps since 2014. She serves as a team chair, was a member of the 2023 Advisory Group for planning the 2023 Peer Corps Day of professional development and training, and was a session presenter at the annual meetings in 2022 and 2023. Perez-Miller was a member of the Peer Corps Committee on Diversity from 2018 to 2022.

Being a member of the HLC Peer Corps is a tremendous responsibility, but an amazing opportunity to work with higher education professionals from across the country. SCHOLARSHIP AUCTION SETS NEW RECORD

On May 5th, the PCC Foundation held its 34th Annual Scholarship Auction inside the Dennis Lesh Sports Arena. This year's goal was again exceeded by auction attendees.

GOAL: \$100,000 FUNDS RAISED: \$107,000

Bidding was active with many of the 39 items going for much higher than their catalog listing in small part due to the thrill of competition and to a larger degree to the philanthropic intent of the auction-goers. This feeling of good will was aided greatly by the testimonials of PCC students as they walked from table to table and expressed their appreciation for the opportunity they were afforded because of scholarship dollars raised.

The goal of the 2023 auction was to raise \$100,000. This was the same dollar amount as the previous year where the final tally was just over at \$101,000. According to Barry Fisher, Executive Director of Institutional Advancement and Alumni Relations, this year's auction total was in excess of \$107,000.

"We are very grateful to all of our sponsors and auction participants for making this our most successful event yet," Fisher said.



Wildlife Outfitting

Wildlife Outfitting and Operations Class Takes Trip to Gila National Forest



April 2023. For the past couple months, the sophomore Guiding in the Outdoors class has been planning a backcountry hunting trip to the Gila National Forest in New Mexico. The Gila was one of the first wilderness areas established in the United States and totals roughly 3.3 million acres. The class went to pursue Merriam's turkey, a high elevation bird primarily found in the western mountain regions of the United States.

The Merriam's hunt is a popular choice for the students who want to complete a "Wild Turkey Grand Slam." To complete the grand slam, a hunter must harvest all four U.S. turkey subspecies (eastern, Rio Grande, Merriam's and Osceola). Once a hunter completes the slam, they will receive a certificate and a record pin from the National Wild Turkey Federation. On the first day in the National Forest, a couple students glassed up three birds but were not able to close the distance before the birds headed down the mountain. The next three days we averaged about 10 miles on foot each day, spike camping into the wilderness portion of the national forest. A few of the students just went to fish. The trout they caught were a nice change from the MREs and freeze-dried meals.

We saw lots of turkey sign during those three days but never laid eyes on another bird. Probably a dozen other hunters stopped and talked to us along the way, saying they had been having the same problems- lots of sign but no birds. The students became particularly attached to two hunters, Kena and Brady. They were ranchers, probably in their early 60s, that had grown up in the Gila Wilderness. They made a living rounding up the feral cattle that are invasive to the Gila. During the elk seasons they would also pack hunters in and out of the mountains on horseback. Kena and Brady would swing by camp around noon each day, spinning stories of the Gila and telling the students where they might go to find turkeys.

On the last full day of hunting we finally found the birds. We heard four different gobblers. The birds would respond to calls but would not come in. After over an hour, the birds disappeared into the mountain and we headed back to pack up camp. According to Brady, "I just don't think the turkeys are feeling frisky enough yet."

Overall, the students said they really enjoyed the trip the Gila. They saw pronghorn, mule deer, coues deer, javelin and more elk than one could count. The Gila is one of the premiere elk hunting units in the United States. Kena told the students, he shot his first elk in the Gila when he was 13. The bull scored over 360 inches (It takes a score of 350 to get into the Boone and Crockett record book).





Barton CC to Offer Licensed Practical Nursing Program at Pratt Community College

Pratt Community College (Pratt CC) is pleased to announce that Barton Community College (BCC) will offer a Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) curriculum on the Pratt campus beginning Fall 2023.

The Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN) granted the proposal at their quarterly meeting in March 2023.

This offering is in addition to the successful facilitation of the Associate Degree of Nursing (ADN) program on the Pratt CC campus that began Fall 2022.

Approximately fifteen students are already secured to begin LPN classes in Fall 2023 without full recruiting efforts, speaking to the quality of BCC's healthcare training, the facilities at Pratt CC and market demands.

Pratt CC President Dr. Michael Calvert is proud to help meet the need.

"We are grateful the State Board again saw the need for expanded healthcare training in this area and recognized the development of the quality partnership that currently exists between Pratt CC and Barton CC. We are proud of the positive response from the Pratt area and the healthcare industry for their support in achieving our goals of providing nursing education in addition to our Allied Health programs."

Barton Community College Vice-President of Instruction Elaine Simmons supports the furthering of the partnership between PCC and BCC.

"Barton's partnership with Pratt Community College (PCC) to extend the College's Associate Degree in Nursing (RN) program has been well received by the Pratt community and surrounding areas. We accepted the follow-up request from PCC's leadership to also add our Licensed Practical Nursing to the Pratt location. Jason Henschel and Leticia Tessi Named PCC Athletes of the Year



The Pratt Community College athletic department has awarded their annual female and male athletes of the year. The athletic coaches can nominate an athlete to be considered for the award. Then after the nominations are received each member of the staff has one vote for the female and male athlete of the year.

Jason Henschel from the wrestling team was named the male athlete of the year. His career record is 82-9 (.901 winning percentage). He is a two-time NJCAA All-American and the 2023 NJCAA National Runner-Up at 133lbs. Henschel is a first team all-conference wrestler and won the NJCAA South Central District Wrestling Championship. Finally, he is a three-time NWCA academic all-American.

Leticia Tessi from the women's soccer team was named the female athlete of the year. She set a school record as a freshman for most goals scored in a season with 14. The previous record was eight. Tessi recorded six assists and was named the KJCCC Offensive Player of the Year. She was first team all KJCCC and was awarded the KJCCC Player of the Week twice throughout the season.

"We are honored to recognize these two individuals as Athletes of the Year," said Athletic Director Tim Swartzendruber. "Not only are they deserving because of their athletic accomplishments, but they have been great ambassadors for Pratt Community College. Congratulations to Jason and Leticia."

Pratt Cheer wins National Runner-Up at NCA Competition



The Pratt cheer team competed at the National Cheerleaders Association College Nationals April 5-9 in Daytona Beach, Fl. This was the third time the team had competed in this event while this was their first year competing in the Intermediate Large Coed Open division. Before competing in this event, the cheer team won the Region VI Intermediate Large Coed Championship back on March 5.

The Beavers competed in Florida against Tyler Junior College, Riverside City College, Long Beach City College, and Tafts University. After the preliminary competition on Thursday, April 6th they sat in second place only .30 points behind the leader.

After their final competition on Friday, April 7th they finished as the National Runner-Up in their division at the NCA competition for the second time in three years. Last season, they finished third in their division.

The team is busy recruiting for next year's team and will begin their 2023-24 season in July by attending a NCA Summer Camp looking for their fourth straight time qualifying for the NCA College Nationals.

Beaver Track & Field Finish Season at Nationals



The Beaver track and field team traveled to Hobbs, NM for the NJCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships May 18-20. The top performer for Pratt was <u>Jamaira Ross</u> finishing sixth in the steeplechase breaking her previous school record with a time of 11:55.35. Ross finished her outdoor season as an All-American.

"It was good to see some people step up and competing, like <u>Jamaira Ross</u> all-American. She came in ranked 9th and ended up finishing 6th. Any time you come in the nationals and do better than you were ranked as, is a win," said Head Track Coach Quintin Powell. "She has put a lot of demanding work with Coach Scott, she did good in XC this year and finished 17th and in indoor she qualified for the regional meet for nationals. This year she just had a different mindset and focus, locked in and intense. It was good to watch her go out and compete and become an all-American for us."

Other top performers for the Beavers include <u>Tishere Dockery</u> in the 400M Hurdles who finished 16 overall with a time of 54.17. Braden Colglazier had a phenomenal season in both indoor and outdoor season and finished tied with ninth with a jump of 1.97M.

Pratt finished their season with two All-Americans, 17 All-KJCCA West, and seven All-Region VI accolades. There were also seven school records broken including the women's 3KM steeplechase, women's outdoor 5KM, women's indoor weight throw, men's indoor weight throw, men's javelin, women's indoor and outdoor 400M.

"This year we had athletes that were our athletes, like 80% that we recruited. We got more of the championship mentality than the previous athletes we had," said Director of Track & Field/Cross Country Matt Scott. "It helped us to score some more of the points, we moved up from no points on the women's side to 13 points, with Jamaira Ross making 9 of those and in the KJCC west we went from 0 to 28 points. And on the men's side we went from no points in the region to 15 points and the KJCC west we went from 2 points to 55 points."

"It was a good year overall. Not the way we wanted to end it, we thought we were going to have more all-Americans," said Coach Powell. "It is something you work for, you want to see all that work that you put in being celebrated, being rewarded with accolades and stuff but it was still a great year."

Unfortunately, the Beavers lost the series 2-1 and ended their season for a second straight season in the opening round of the playoffs. Pratt ended their season 25-33 overall and 12-20 in conference play.



Game One Recap

Both teams were held scoreless through the first four and a half innings until Cowley managed to score three runs off three walks in the bottom of the fifth inning. In the bottom of the sixth inning the Tigers added three more runs to their lead off a three-run homerun. Pratt scored in the top of the ninth inning off a two-run homerun by <u>Garryn Plummer</u> but lost game one by a score of 6-2.

To start game two, Cowley scored four runs in the bottom of the first inning. Pratt was able to cut the lead by two runs in the top of the second inning off three hits. Both teams scored one run in the third inning for a 5-3 Cowley lead. Six runs came in for Pratt in the top of the fourth inning off three hits, five walks and two wild pitches. Cowley scored two runs in the bottom of the fifth inning to cut the Pratt lead to 9-7. Both teams scored again in the seventh inning to make it a 10-8 Beaver lead. The Tigers brought one run home in the ninth inning while stranding one runner on base as Pratt won 10-9.
