

Wildlife Outfitting and Operations Takes Trip

A group of sophomore students planned a backcountry hunting trip to the Gila National Forest in New Mexico to pursue Merriam's turkey. The forest is one of the first wilderness areas in the USA and covers about 3.3 million acres. The students went on the trip to complete a "Wild Turkey Grand Slam" which requires harvesting all four U.S. turkey subspecies. The students enjoyed the trip, saw various wildlife, and learned about the Gila's rich hunting history.

New STEM Club Visits Local Area Schools & Library

Pratt Community College's STEM club, led by students and faculty members, is making waves by teaching Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math to area students. They traveled to different schools and libraries, performing experiments like Elephant Toothpaste, expanding marshmallows, and creating static electricity. 


Three PCC Students Recognized as PTK All-State Scholars

The event, co-sponsored by PTK and the Kansas Association of Community College Trustees, honored the Kansas All-State Academic Team.

Beaver Wrestling Win Third Conference Title in a Row

The Pratt wrestling team won their third consecutive Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference Championship by defeating Cloud County, Northwest Tech, Colby, and Barton at the Jayhawk Duals in Salina, KS. Head Wrestling Coach Ken Kepley was named KJCCC Coach of the Year, while Devon Dawson and Easton Taylor received individual awards.




Men's Tennis Finishes Tenth at NJCAA Championships

The Beaver men's tennis team finished their season ranked 10th at the NJCAA Men's Tennis Championships. The team achieved a 9-11 overall record with a runner-up position in regular season KJCCC play and third-place position at the NJCAA Region VI Tournament. Head Tennis Coach Jeret Johnson praised the sophomores for their contribution to the team's success and expressed hope for continued progress in the right direction.

Pratt Cheer Wins National Runner-Up at NCA Competition

The Pratt cheer team competed in the National Cheerleaders Association College Nationals in Florida for the third time, finishing as the National Runner-Up in their division. They had won the Region VI Intermediate Large Coed Championship earlier. The team attended a NCA Summer Camp in July to qualify for the NCA College Nationals for the fourth time in a row.





Beaver Track & Field Finish Season at Nationals

The Pratt Beaver track and field team competed in the NJCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships in Hobbs, NM. Jamaira Ross finished sixth in the steeplechase and set a new school record, becoming an All-American. Tishere Dockery and Braden Colglazier were also top performers. Overall, Pratt finished with two All-Americans, 17 All-KJCCA West, and seven All-Region VI accolades. The team broke seven school records.




Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day

On December 9th, the Pratt Community College Esports team competed in the Wildcat League Finals, held at Kansas State University. The Wildcat League is a coalition of Kansas community colleges that challenge each other in various games throughout the fall semester. The top four teams from the league's competition earned the right to participate in the finals.

The Overwatch 2 team advanced to the finals as the third seed, winning 2-0 in the semi-finals against Highland Community College, the second seed. Unfortunately, they lost 3-0 to the first seed, Independence Pirates, concluding their fall semester as runners-up.

Head Esports coach, Charles Keefer, praised the team's tenacity and resilience, despite recent roster changes and game updates. He said, "To end the

With the postponement of last week's tri-dual the No. two ranked Beaver wrestling team are eager to now start their conference season on Thursday, January 18 against Barton Community College. What is being dubbed the Battle of Highway 281 has Pratt up 6-3 in the series. The action is scheduled to get underway at 7:00 PM in the Beaver Dome. The Beavers will host their rescheduled tri-dual against Neosho County Community College and Cloud County Community College on Monday, January 22. The team will then travel to Parsons, Kan. on January 24 to face Labette Community College and Colby Community College.

<u>Beavers Begin Conference Title Defense</u>

The Beavers remain ranked No. two in the nation heading into 2024. After a successful fall tournament season Pratt is ready to defend their three-time Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference title with a competitive dual schedule throughout January and February. Several wrestlers remain nationally ranked heading into the spring semester.

Scouting the Panthers

Since 2011, the Beavers are 8-4 over the Neosho County Panthers most recently



with a 54-0 sweep back on January 24, 2023. The last time the Panthers' defeated Pratt was back in 2019. This season the Panthers sit at 0-3 with dual losses against Labette, Southeast, and Carl Albert State College. Wrestlers to watch for the Panthers include Treyton Burns 133-lbs, Johnathan Perryman 141-lbs, Hunter Jennings 157-lbs and Dilen Barrington-Miller 197 lbs.

<u>Scouting the T-Birds</u>

In the past three seasons, Pratt has defeated Cloud County in duals with their most recent win coming on January 29, 2023, 44-6. The T-Birds are currently 1-2 this season with one win against Trinidad State and two losses against No. 1 Western Wyoming and Northeastern Junior College. Easton Boone at 165 lbs leads the T-Birds with a 2-1 dual record. Before winter break, Gavin Netting-285 lbs defeated the No. 10 ranked Riley Butt from Northeastern Junior College.



Beavers face a heart-breaking loss in Texas

Pratt Community College fought a good fight against South Plains College, the No. 1 ranked team, with a final score of 87-82. The game took place in Levelland, Texas on Wednesday, January 3.

Pratt started strong, taking a five-point lead in the first half, thanks to Caleb Smith's impressive performance. Smith led the team with 21 points while Deon McLaughlin contributed 15 points and 5 rebounds. Zion Cruz was the top scorer for Pratt, finishing with 25 points, including 4 three-pointers.

South Plains, however, managed to turn the game around in the second half. Jermahri Hill led the team with 20 points, followed by Malique Ewin, who scored 18 points on 7-8 shooting. Jabori

Mcghee also made a significant impact, scoring 15 points and grabbing 6 rebounds.

Although both teams had their fair share of turnovers, South Plains managed to capitalize on their opportunities and convert them into points. They committed 15 turnovers while Pratt committed 13.





A Thrilling Basketball Match with Independence

On December 9, 2023, Independence Community College managed to secure a hard-fought victory over Pratt Community College, with a final score of 75-69. The game began with a competitive first quarter, in which Pratt took the lead, scoring 19 points compared to the Pirates' 16 points. Princess Anderson of Pratt Community College emerged as a key player, contributing 12 points in the quarter.

However, Independence fought back in the second quarter, outscoring the Beavers with a score of 25-16. Kyunna Thomas and Merveille Nkoyock were instrumental in Independence's comeback, combining for 19 points in the first half. Macy Hanzlick also had a strong performance, scoring 16 points by halftime.

The third quarter saw a close battle between the two teams, with Pratt scoring 21 points and the Pirates scoring 15 points. Isis Sanders showcased her scoring ability, contributing 18 points overall in the game. In the



final quarter, both teams fought hard to secure the victory. Serenity Echols and Sabrina Larsson of Independence played crucial roles in their team's success, combining for 25 points in the game. Princess Anderson of Pratt had an outstanding performance, scoring 26 points and grabbing 9 rebounds.
