PCC Accreditation Confirmed As Students Begin New Semester in Pratt

While Pratt Community College plans and changes plans for the upcoming school year, hard work in the past has resulted in the Higher Learning Commission reaffirming the colleges accreditation for another 10 years. The college has just received confirmation of accreditation.

The HLC visitation team was on campus in March. They were impressed with community, faculty, staff and Trustee involvement with the college during the visit.

While accreditation is complete, the college does need to work on a couple of monitoring reports, one for the nursing program that is rebuilding and working on improving the pass percentage for the mandatory NCLEX exam on the first attempt.

Student assessment is a three year process that is changing and already underway. The college has four years to complete these reports, said PCC President Michael Calvert.

The Pratt Community College faculty and staff continue to prepare as students return to campus to attend class in person.

The fall semester will not have a fall break and classes will wrap up by Thanksgiving with some limited interaction for must have hands-on classes. Labor Day could be a teaching day.

Kent Adams, vice president of finance and operations, said negative ion units will be installed in the residence halls before school starts. Face Shields and gloves have been ordered, fabric masks, hand sanitizers, cleaning equipment, foggers for rooms, signage, infrared thermometers and more are already in place.

"I think were in good shape," Adams said. "We have almost everything here already."

A college task force, made of a cross section of campus departments, has held regular meetings and been working to get students enrolled. Any student that visits campus is asked if they have been traveling, have they been in larger

gatherings, have they been exposed to the virus.

An isolation and quarantine response team has been established to assist any student that has to be quarantined on campus. This is not an “if” it happens but “when” it happens mentality, said Lisa Perez Miller vice president of student and enrollment management.

Residence hall check-in will be extended over two days to minimize contact between students. Students can bring up to three guests to help with move in.

Resident hall students have already been talking about health safety and many have more strict ideas than Pratt residents.

Adams said they are looking at a 10 percent decrease in credit hours at 23,409 but he said he thinks those numbers will improve as they get closer to the start of class in August.

Calvert said with PCC rates so much cheaper than other colleges and universities, enrollment numbers could be better than last year.

Among the many changes will be all fall sports except cross county will be moved to the spring. The National Junior College Athletic Association made the decision in an attempt to buy time to get students involved in academics and training so sports can open up in the spring semester, Calvert said.

The next couple of weeks will be pivotal for sports, based on what is going on with the virus across the country. Calvert is anxious for sports to get started. The college cut the ribbon on a new track and soccer facility last year but hasn't had a chance to have a game on the site.

Jerry Sanko, campus IT director, has been named Chief Information Officer. He will retain the same IT duties. This is a new title and cabinet level position. The position was created since all learning is touched by technology.


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PCC Automotive Program Expands to Kingman

The Pratt Community College Automotive Technology program has recently expanded to Kingman, Kan. PCC Automotive Technology now has three locations: the main campus on Pratt, the South Central Career Pathways center in Attica, and the newly established Kingman High School location. Courses that will be offered are Engine Performance 1, Electrical 1, Steering and Suspension 1, Steering and Suspension 2, Brakes 1 and Brakes 2. All course offerings count for college credit and are transferable to any vocational school in the state of Kansas. All courses also lead to ASE certification.

“The mission of PCC Automotive Technology is to provide quality hands-on training so students can enter the workforce and become a productive member of society,” said Daryl Lucas, PCC automotive instructor.

“Automotive repair shops and dealerships are in search of entry-level mechanics,” said Lucas. “The PCC automotive department is trying to help fill the need for entry level mechanics.”

To accomplish this task, the facility at Kingman has been renovated, and new technology has been added. This technology will allow faculty to teach students on up to date equipment and practices.

Kingman native, Tyler Wells, will be the automotive technology instructor at the Kingman location. Wells grew up in Kingman and graduated from Kingman High School. Wells studied automotive technology and graduated from WyoTECH in Laramie, Wyo. Wells then worked at Midway Motors, Mel Hambelton Ford and Lubbers as a mechanic.

“I grew up working on cars on the farm,” said Wells. “I enjoyed it and thought I would make a career of it.”

When Wells was asked why he wanted to enter the education field, he said.

“I believe I can make a difference in young people's lives and help them become professionals in the profession I enjoy.”

Wells's goals for the upcoming year, are to have a smooth transition year, provide current mechanical practices, and to have students leave the class feeling confident to work with their hands.

They will also have the chance to be trained by industry professionals, participate in a race car project, car shows and many other exciting activities. All these experiences prepare students to become ASE certified prior to graduation, enhancing earning potential and career opportunities.

It's Always Been About The People for Rose

Saying goodbye has never been easy for me. On Friday, Aug. 14, I will retire from the Pratt Tribune. That is also the day I turn 70.

After 20 years and a month and a half, I'm turning in my camera, shutting off the computer, taking the note pad out of my pocket and saying goodbye to a job that has enriched my life.

For 7377 days I have been charged with telling the stories of the people of Pratt County and I will miss it.

I will miss the people most of all. This job has allowed me to meet so many people that I would never have had the chance to meet if I had been doing something else.

The hours were often long and my days were often interrupted by a blaring tone on the scanner.

I have been witness to people's best days, happiest days, average days, scariest days, worst days and sometimes last days. I have lost several friends along the way including my mother, father, brother and sister who all died in the space of four years and four days.

I witnessed amazing acts of dignity and courage as emergency responders came to the aid of those in need. There were numerous grass and structure fires, too many to list here. There were many wrecks, some with tragic loss of life. So many deer vs vehicle accidents took place, I lost count. Whether it was EMS, fire, police, sheriff, rescue, I watched as these dedicated individuals stopped what they were doing to help others, sometimes at risk to their own lives.

Much of this job is reporting on the day-to-day events in the community. There were countless meetings as local government made plans for a better community. School districts battled with budgets to provide the best possible education for the children in Pratt County.

Change has been a constant over the last 20 years. Multiple dozens of new businesses opened their doors and most succeeded. Some, like the Parrish Hotel and Pratt Regional Medical Center, underwent major renovations to better serve the community.

Some businesses fell on hard times especially in the gas and oil industry and most recently from COVID-19.

Many events had powerful impacts on the community. The Greensburg tornado in 2007, the tornadoes in Pratt County in 2002 and 2008, the ice storm in December 2007, the Labor Day flood in 2018, the snowstorm in 2009, Maple Street extension, changing U.S. 54 to four lanes, the downtown sidewalk and street beautification projects all impacted lives.

Tragic house fires on Dec. 23, 2013 that killed twin boys, and on Jan. 25, 2018 that claimed the lives of a young mother and her four very young children hit the community hard.

We have little violent crime but some lives were taken by violent acts. Some days, I had to go home and cry in the dark to deal with reality.

There were many memorable moments like getting to be in President Bushes media pool when he visited Greensburg and again a year later at Greensburg graduation. I interviewed members of Congress and the Senate, both state and national and several World War II veterans including Bob Morgan who flew the Memphis Belle. I also interviewed youngsters at the fair. I got to take a ride in a B-17 and in a powered parachute and ride in a steam locomotive.

Looking back, there have been amazing changes in the community over the past 20

years. People with vision started new businesses, new sports complexes, remodeled existing businesses, new energy facilities, new restaurants, new education facilities and the list goes on and on.

The Miss Kansas Pageant and the Pratt County Fair were always busy times at the Tribune with lots of interviews and lots and lots of photos. I've no idea how many photos I've taken but it must be in the hundreds of thousands.

Other annual events like Christmas in the Park, Community Thanksgiving dinner, Lemon Park Lights, graduation, prom, homecoming, July 4 fireworks, play productions and Community Concert series provided lots of excitement.

Through it all, it was the people of Pratt and Pratt County whose stories made this a vibrant community, and my job an interesting one.

"I recognize the outstanding work done by Gale Rose over the past 18 years as a reporter for the Pratt Tribune. Gale reported on board meetings and other activities at Pratt Community College and was always fair and supportive of PCC," said Dr. Michael Calvert, PCC President. "As a former alum of PCC and a returning student this fall, we wish Gale well in his retirement years."



Brock Thewman, most recently a men's assistant coach at Dodge City, has been named to the same position as a member of the Beavers women's basketball staff.

"I'm very proud and excited to have Brock Thewman join my staff here at Pratt," said Ishee. "Brock has a lot of maturity and an impressive basketball and academic background for a young coach. He was an accomplished high school player, he's been involved at the Division III level with Cliff Carroll who has coached in the Big XII and Southland Conference, and he spent this past year in the Jayhawk at conference member Dodge City, so he understands the landscape of our league athletically, academically, socially, travel wise, community, etc...We expect him to be a great addition!"

Thewman, 24, replaces former assistant Brian Koller who accepted a position at Henderson State University earlier this summer. Thewman's coaching career began at the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) level, where, as head coach, his Elite Red squad posted a combined 54-6 record over the course of three summers. He eventually landed within the collegiate ranks, first working as a graduate assistant at Sul Ross State University (TX) during the 2018-19 season. After one year, Thewman accepted a position at Dodge City in the summer of 2019, before eventually arriving at Pratt Community College.

A Texas native, Thewman was a standout player at Hamshire-Fannet High School, where he joined the 1,000-point club for the Longhorns before graduating in 2014. Rated as one of the top prep basketball players in Southeast Texas, Thewman also participated in varsity soccer and cross country. Thewman is a graduate of Texas A&M University, having earned a Bachelor of Science in sport management with a minor in coaching and business. He also holds a Master of Science in human and health performance from Sul Ross State University.

NJCAA Announces Fall Sports Moving to Spring Amidst Pandemic

The NJCAA issued a statement to its respective schools, officially moving a majority of scheduled fall sports to the spring, including men's soccer, women's soccer, and women's volleyball. Cross country and half-marathon will be unaffected, however.

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All winter sports competition will begin in January with a majority of championship seasons moved from March to April. These sports include men's and women's basketball, wrestling, and swimming and diving. Men's and women's bowling and men's and women's indoor track and field will be held at the beginning of March.

Spring sports competition remains intact with minor adjustments to dates. These sports include baseball, softball, beach volleyball, men's and women's golf, men's and women's lacrosse, track and field, and men's and women's tennis.

Along with the adjustments to competition season and championship dates, the NJCAA has provided information as it relates to scrimmage and practice dates and allowances in the fall. Championship dates are subject to change based on championship facility availability.

Wrestling Named Academic Team of the Year, Five Other Sports Recognized

The wrestling program at Pratt Community College has developed somewhat of a monopoly on the NJCAA's Academic Team of the Year for its respective sports, an award given to the team with the highest collective grade point average. Said monopoly is not without merit, because for the eighth-consecutive year, Ken Kepley's wrestlers have yet to let the award leave Pratt.

With a 3.21 team GPA, Pratt Wrestling was named the 2019-20 Academic Team of the Year, as five other sports were also recognized by the NJCAA after finished the 2019-20 academic year with team GPA's above the 3.0 threshold, including baseball (3.05), men's basketball (3.07), women's soccer (3.33), women's basketball (3.34), and volleyball (3.43).



"This is the award that defines our program," said Kepley. "Even with COVID-19, this program kept working and using their resources throughout the semester and I couldn't be more proud of this team. All year we have had mentor meetings every Sunday, grade checks every Monday, and PASS (Program of Athletic Student Success), study hall every day of the week to make sure they are on top of their schoolwork and communicating with their instructors. We also cannot do this alone. This is a defined reflection of the hard work that surrounds us starting from Monette DePew, our Student Success Team, faculty communication, and our PASS Program. Many people always ask how I do it and all I can say is that it takes a village and I just hold the program accountable and to a high standard just as much in the classroom as we do competing."

"We are extremely proud of PCC Athletics and our academic achievements this year," said athletic director Tim Swartzendbruber. "Considering everything that happened this spring, our coaches deserve much credit for helping encourage and support distance learning as we navigated uncharted waters. I also want to commend our faculty who were great in working with these students and showing flexibility and compassion throughout the spring term. Congratulations to all."

August Diversity: Women's Right to Vote (1920)

On June 4th, 1919 Congress passed the 19th Amendment to the Constitution. This amendment was then ratified on August 18, 1920. The 19th Amendment of the United States of America guarantees all American women the right to vote. The process to the 19th Amendment began in the middle of the 19th century and took many generations of woman suffrage supporters lobbying, writing, lecturing and marching until this was passed. Very few early supporters lived to see the amendment pass.

Starting in the 1800s, women organized and petitioned for the right to vote. In July 1848, 200 woman suffragists met in Seneca Falls, New York to discuss women's rights. After approving measures asserting the right of women to educational and employment opportunities, they passed a resolution that declared "it is the duty of the women of this country to secure to themselves their sacred right to the elective franchise." This marked the beginning of the woman suffrage movement in America.

The first national woman's rights convention was held in 1850, this convention was then held annually after 1850. In 1869, Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton founded the National Woman Suffrage Association. They pushed for a woman's suffrage amendment to be added to the constitution.

In 1917, America entered World War 1. During this time, women helped assist in the war efforts in a variety of ways. Their efforts helped break down the remaining opposition to woman suffrage. In 1918, women had acquired equal suffrage with men in 15 states.

By 1916, almost all of the major suffrage organizations were united behind the goal of a constitutional amendment. When New York adopted woman suffrage in 1917 and President Wilson changed his position to support an amendment in 1918, the political balance began to shift.

The amendment was passed by the House of Representatives on May 21, 1919, two weeks after it was passed in the House of Representatives the Senate passed it.
