Mel Hambelton Ford Visits Kingman Automotive Facility

Pratt Community College prides itself on being able to apply real-world insights and training when preparing students for the workforce.

It is a mutual benefit for students and businesses when they are brought together on campus through our technical programs. Students are able to meet with employers to ask questions about what it's like on the job, and employers are able to offer insight into their evolving industries and find potential hires in the process.

Kelly Hamilton and Josh Proffit from the Mel Hambelton Ford dealership met with students at PCC's Automotive Technology facility at Kingman High School to talk about what it's like to work in a dealership.

Students from Kingman, Medicine Lodge, Pratt, Attica and Norwich learned about the way new hires enter the workforce at their dealership as apprentices, and work their way all the way up to senior master technicians, as well as the overall operation of the service department.

They discussed the importance of communication and being thorough with inspections and repair orders, staying current with certifications as the

industry evolves, how much money you can make and considerations when choosing a company to work for so it's a good fit for yourself and the dealership.

Students asked questions about what a typical day is like for an auto technician, what kind of hours to expect, the different types of certifications required for different kinds of vehicles that are serviced, and what kind of benefits are offered.

Then they were able to check out new features on new vehicles under the hood and in the driver's seat.

Automotive Technology Instructors in attendance were Tyler Wells from the Kingman facility, Daniel Meng from the Attica campus and Alan Ziegler and Philip Spillman from Pratt.

Rodeo Team Reunited After 30 Years

It's been more than thirty years since they helped weld and build the outdoor rodeo arena on campus at Pratt Community College, and just as long since they were on campus for the construction of the horse barns and indoor arena.

The 1982-1985 Rodeo Alumni members returned to Pratt, Kansas in October of 2021 for an exclusive tour of the college, the new farm and rodeo facilities.

They were greeted by PCC Foundation Director Barry Fisher and guided on the tour by Agriculture instructor Lori Montgomery, who was happy to show them around on a tour focused around the Ag Education Program and the facilities for students in both locations.

"We had a great tour and visit with these PCC Rodeo Alumni and their former coach. Welcome back to campus guys, it was great to see you. Thanks for your support!"

The group lived in the basement of Novotny Hall during their time as PCC students. During their visit, they spent time recalling memories of former PCC employees; Mattie Kaiser- the dorm parent, Don Schwartz- former PCC football coach and told a lot of stories about their college adventures at PCC.

Kenton Baughman is a former PCC faculty member and Rodeo coach from 1981-1991. He remembers when the

arena needed to be rebuilt, and all the help it took to accomplish that task.

"Admin was able to fund materials, and we received donations. Students provided most of the labor and the welding program helped us out. We helped the college continue to grow after the football program was eliminated. When I started coaching, we only had about 10 people the first year, and by the last year we had between 65 and 70."

Baughman even recalls trying to recruit current PCC Rodeo Coach Rocky Patterson as a student once upon a time.

It was good to return to campus and share in the memories.

"It was fantastic to be back. Some I had not seen since we left college 35 plus years ago. People's voices don't change much and sometimes your appearance changes a bit, but I could also identify some of them just by the way they walk!"

The group missed being able to see some they may have known on campus by visiting on a Saturday. But the hope is that this visit will inspire an annual visit to PCC with more returning members in the future.

MENTAL HEALTH MINUTE



Breaking Down Mental Wellness: Physical Well-Being

What a fitting first look into the major types of wellness during the first holiday meal month of the season. Many of us often forget that physical and mental well-being are connected. They are not truly separate, no matter how much we try to keep them that way. For instance, how many of us when we are bored or sad or mad turn to food? We are feeding out mental side using our physical bodies. See? They go hand-in-hand.

Let me include a brief disclaimer before launching into this type. This is not my forte when it comes to mental well-being. Because of my past and my present choices, my physical well-being is on the top of my list to improve.



As a reminder, physical well-being is understanding what a healthy diet and exercise routine looks like in order to put them into a daily practice. When we begin to do this and get to the point of routine practice, our bodies feel better. We help ourselves prevent many diseases, heal our guts, limit health challenges we may be dealing with or could potentially deal with, and boost our mental well-being.

What ways can we heal our physical well-being to help with healing our mental well-being?

- 1. Not just eating healthy, but eating for our health. This does not just mean to make sure to get the proper servings of fruits and veggies, etc. It also means to make sure to get the right nutrients for our bodies and drinking plenty of water. This is just a small amount of what we can do here. More information can be attained from meeting with your general practitioner, our nurse on campus, coaches, and our HPR faculty.
- 2. Detox the body from toxins. Unfortunately, we hurt ourselves with toxins that come in by way of certain plastics and, even, processed foods.
- 3. Correct nutritional deficiencies. This is going to look different for each of us. We can learn this by first meeting with our general practitioner who may order lab work and then may refer on to nutritionists and others to help you learn what the body needs or what is too much.
- 4. Remove plastic from the home. It is recommended to look for those items that are marked BPA-free. Another suggestion is to invest in a reusable water bottle.

Some of these ways are controversial depending on who you talk to. The important part of this aspect of well-being is to learn what YOUR body needs to not only make you health physically, but also give you a boost emotionally.

PRATT COMMUNITY COLLEGE CELEBRATE DIVERSITY TEAM

National Native American Heritage Month

What started at the turn of the century as an effort to gain a day of recognition for the significant contributions the first Americans made to the establishment and growth of the U.S., has resulted in a whole month being designated for that purpose.

One of the very proponents of an American Indian Day was Dr. Arthur C. Parker, a Seneca Indian, who was the director of the Museum of Arts and Science in Rochester, N.Y. He persuaded the Boy Scouts of America to set aside a day for the "First Americans" and for three years they adopted such a day. In 1915, the annual Congress of the American Indian Association meeting in Lawrence, Kans., formally approved a plan concerning American Indian Day. It directed its president, Rev. Sherman Coolidge, an Arapahoe, to call upon the country to observe such a day. Coolidge issued a proclamation on Sept. 28, 1915, which declared the second Saturday of each May as an American Indian Day and contained the first formal appeal for recognition of Indians as citizens.

The year before this proclamation was issued, Red Fox James, a Blackfoot Indian, rode horse-back from state to state seeking approval for a day to honor Indians. On December 14, 1915, he presented the endorsements of 24 state governments at the White House. There is no record, however, of such a national day being proclaimed.

The first American Indian Day in a state was declared on the second Saturday in May 1916 by the governor of New York. Several states celebrate the fourth Friday in September. In Illinois, for example, legislators enacted such a day in 1919. Presently, several states have designated Columbus Day as Native American Day, but it continues to be a day we observe without any recognition as a national legal holiday.

In 1990 President George H. W. Bush approved a joint resolution designating November 1990 "National American Indian Heritage Month." Similar proclamations, under variants on the name (including "Native American Heritage Month" and "National American Indian and Alaska Native Heritage Month") have been issued each year since 1994.

PRACTICAL NURSING

PCC's Practical Nursing Program to Expand into Hybrid Learning Format

During the quarterly board meeting with the Kansas State Board of Nursing (KBSN), PCC obtained approval to expand the Practical Nursing (PN-LPN) program into a synchronous-hybrid learning format for the Fall 2022 school year.

This allows Pratt Community College to extend access to the program by delivering live lectures via Zoom to students unable to travel to the Pratt area. Clinicals for LPN students can be completed on campus at PCC, or at an approved health care facility near the student's location.

Practical Nursing classes also continue to be offered on the Pratt campus.

PCC also recently announced a forming partnership with Barton Community College to facilitate the Associate Degree of Nursing (ADN) training on the Pratt campus, expected to begin in the Fall of 2022.

Strong offerings in the CNA, CMA and Home Health programs in Allied Health also continue at Pratt Community College in face-fo-face and hybrid formats.

PCC is proud to be able to offer a variety of options to help meet the increasing and urgent need for health-care professionals in Kansas.

Our Nursing and Allied Health programs also qualify for the Kansas Promise Scholarship, where students can get books, tuition and fees paid for with money allocated from the State of Kansas. Check it out!



Pratt Community College Awarded \$10,000 Grant from NJCAA Foundation, NFL FLAG, and RCX Sports

Pratt Community College was recently notified by the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) that it had been awarded a \$10,000 grant, provided by the NJCAA Foundation, NFL FLAG, and RCX Sports, towards establishing women's flag football as a competitive sport.

"We are excited to be a recipient of the grant, which will help offset start-up costs of adding a women's flag football program," said Pratt Community College President Dr. Michael Calvert.

The grant is part of a major joint initiative with the NJCAA, National Football League (NFL), and RCX Sports in promoting women's flag football across intercollegiate athletics.

"There are some other community colleges in Kansas planning on adding this sport, as well as several NAIA schools that already have the program up and running," said Calvert. "With our new track & field, soccer facility, we have a place to practice and compete, but it will be nice to have other schools already competing so a full schedule can be achieved."

In March, the NJCAA announced the \$150,000 grant provided by the NFL to support the initiative of expanding women's flag football. Since then, 11 grants have been awarded to NJCAA member colleges to grow the sport and encourage other two-year colleges to consider adding the program.

"The NJCAA Foundation is passionate about the value women's flag football brings to institutions' overall growth, the student-athlete experience, and equality across playing fields," stated Brian Luckett, NJCAA Foundation Executive Director. "This is an opportunity for women of the association to compete at the highest level and we are fortunate to work hand in hand with NFL FLAG and RCX Sports during this exciting time."

Pratt Community College Athletic Director Tim Swartzendruber is firm in his belief that the addition of women's flag football can only be a net positive for the institution.

"Women's flag football is one of the fastest growing sports currently in the United States," said Swartzendruber. "The fact that we can begin this program through a partnership with the NJCAA Foundation, NFL FLAG, and RCX Sports is truly exciting for Pratt Community College and the Pratt community. We have the opportunity to be one of the first community colleges in Kansas to start the sport and we will make it a great success at PCC."

It is exciting to see junior colleges offer NFL FLAG as a varsity sport to female athletes."

"I am very proud of Aron for getting after it from the start and setting the school record," said Director of Cross County, Track and Field Joel Pearson. "We have the best 1-2-3 in school history, but still lack depth."

On Saturday, October 30th the team traveled to Colby, KS to participate in the region six championship hosted at the Meadow Lake Golf Course. The men's 8K race started at 10:00 am and the women's 5K race started at 10:45 am.

"We are looked forward to regionals and hoped to improve individual and as a team," said Coach Pearson.
