LOOK BACK AT 2021



PCC HONORS TWO PHI THETA KAPPA ALL-KANSAS SCHOLARS

PCC held a ceremony on campus to honor two Phi Theta Kappa All-Kansas Scholars, Cydney Larson and Alexia Torres. The students were selected by PCC faculty to represent the PCC's PTK chapter at the state level. PTK Advisor Jason Ratcliffe notes that students are selected based on outstanding academic achievement as well as accomplishments and services rendered outside the classroom. They were awarded a scholarship and recognized for outstanding achievement.

PCC HOST FIRST-EVER INAUGURAL BEAVER CLASSIC

Pratt's Track & Field program christened the school's new track/soccer complex by hosting the first-ever Beaver Classic. Simply hosting an event of such a magnitude was a win for Pratt Community College, but the performances of the Beavers' track athletes elevated the day to further heights. 16 area teams competed in the Beaver Classic at the new facility, bringing numerous athletes and spectators to the Pratt community for the day.



SEVEN BEAVERS IN TRACK CLAIM ALL-AMERICAN STATUS AT NJCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

PCC Track & Field program elevated its status not only in the KJCCC, but in the eyes of the nation as well. Seven of PCC's athletes saw their work pay off in All-American currency. Tebogo Maseema, Kashawn Baptiste, Marvin Jean-Francois, Mark Emillien, Jamaal Morris Jr., Zach McPhee and Greg Curry claimed All-American status during the NJCAA Championships.

WRESTLING AWARDED NINTH-CONSECUTIVE NJCAA ACADEMIC TEAM OF THE YEAR & WIN FIRST EVER KJCCC TITLE

History hung in the balance as the second-ranked Beavers were not only chasing the program's first-ever undefeated dual record, but wins over Colby and Labette also meant Pratt Community College would become conference champions, another first for the program. Approaching nearly a decade of consistent performance, the Pratt wrestling program was named the NJCAA's Academic Team of the Year, an honor bestowed upon the program with the highest team GPA in its respective sport.



PCC ANNOUNCES THE RETURN OF MEN'S AND WOMEN'S TENNIS AND A SUCCESSFUL FIRST SEASON

The return of the Men's and Women's Tennis program was announced in April 2021. Coach Jeret Johnson was named head coach soon thereafter, and the men's team began competing in Fall 2021. The Beavers finished a successful first season with two doubles teams ranked in the top 25 teams in the nation by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA).

CHEER WINS INTERMEDIATE SMALL COED OPEN DIVISION AT NATIONALS

The PCC cheerleading squad just brought home one of the prestigious awards in the program's history. PCC placed 2nd overall in the Intermediate Small Coed Open Division in Daytona, FL with a total performance score of 92.31. Coach Napier described what it took to get there, for herself and for her athletes. "It takes a special group to operate at this level all season and this team had its rough moments but put in the work even when they didn't feel like it and it paid off. They are one of the few teams that get to experience what it's like to place on the national stage. The feeling is indescribable, and the enjoyment is incomparable."

WOMEN'S SOCCER SETS TEAM RECORD FOR PROGRAM WINS, RUNNER UP IN KJCCC STANDINGS

The Beaver women's soccer team had an exciting season with well-attended competitions. The team won a program record of 12 wins, also finishing as runner-up in the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference (KJCCC) for the second straight year. The league also announced the Division II women's soccer post season honors. Three players were named to the All-KJCCC First Team. Sophomores Amaya Meyers, Jada Lopez, and Svenja Arnold were all recognized. Three players were named to the All-KJCCC Honorable Mention including sophomore Quemberli Merida and freshman Natalia Richartz and Jade Massing.



ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIP AUCTION HELD VIRTUALLY

Due to Covid-19 restrictions, PCC held the annual Scholarship Auction as a virtual event. Auction sponsors and donors made this virtual event another success, with 100% of the money raised going back to the students. The auction goal was \$60,000 and PCC was able to raise \$55,804 which is 93% of that goal. PCC President, Dr. Calvert thanked Barry Fisher and Donna Meier Pfeifer for their hard work and dedication to this event.

ESPORTS BECOMES NJCAA SANCTIONED EVENT

Competitive, organized gaming, also known as eSports, got an upgrade. It is now an NJCAA-sanctioned activity at Pratt Community College under the Athletics department. eSports Head Coach Chris Nelson sees it as a welcome sign of the times, due to the unprecedented growth of the sport and its integration of the collegiate environment. They are a welcome addition into the Beaver Athletics family.

TRACK & SOCCER COMPLEX, LETTER TO THE COMMUNITY

The Track and Soccer Complex (TSC) Management Committee released a letter to the Pratt community regarding new facility funding, construction and use. The TSC Management Committee is comprised of representatives from Pratt Community College and the City of Pratt, appointed by the stakeholders of the TSC. The funding, creation, management and ongoing maintenance of the TSC is a project of great complexity and magnitude, with several moving parts. The joint statement was created for the purpose of disseminating accurate information to the community regarding the TSC.

PARTNERSHIP WITH BARTON COMMUNITY COLLEGE FOR ADN NURSING PROGRAM, LPN PROGRAM EXPANDS TO HYBRID FORMAT

The Kansas State Board of Nursing (KBSN) approved a proposal for Pratt Community College to partner with Barton Community College for the delivery of the Associate Degree of Nursing (ADN) program on the PCC campus. Final approval from the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) is expected in March 2022. PCC also obtained approval to expand the Practical Nursing (LPN) program into a synchronous-hybrid learning format for Fall 2022.



WOMEN'S FLAG FOOTBALL COMING TO BEAVER NATION

Pratt Community College was notified by the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) that it was awarded a \$10,000 grant towards establishing Women's Flag Football as a competitive sport. The grant is part of a major initiative sponsored by the National Football League (NFL) in promoting the emerging sport. The Board of Trustees approved the addition of Women's Flag Football for the 2022-23 school year and Zac Rambo was named head coach of the new program.

MEN'S SOCCER WINS REGIONAL VI CHAMPIONSHIP

The men's soccer program has won their first ever division two Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference (KJCCC) regular season championship with an overall record of 7-6 and a conference record of 5-3. In addition to winning the conference championship the Beavers clinched the first seed in the regional playoffs which secured home field advantage throughout the playoffs.



KBOR FILM CREW VISIT EPT PROGRAM

A Cox Media crew was on the Pratt Community College campus filming on behalf of the Kansas Board of Regents (KBOR) to showcase energy-related technical training and careers. PCC's Electrical Power Technology (EPT) program students were training on the "pole farm" with program Director Dave Campbell and instructor Jeff Hoffman. The promotional videos will be released by KBOR in 2022.

MENTAL HEALTH MINUTE



Back At It – Workplace Mental Well-Being

The end of the holiday season brings us back to work, which is our next focus on mental well-being in my self-titled Mental Wellness series of the Mental Health Minute. As a brief reminder before diving right in, workplace well-being focuses on our abilities to pursue interests, values, and purpose in life to gain meaning and happiness, along with professional enrichment.

First, a statistic. One in four Americans describe themselves as being “super stressed out” because of feeling torn between juggling heavy workloads, managing relationships and family responsibilities, and squeezing in outside interests (Mental Health America, 2021).

It is easy for us to get in a rush to get it all done, whether that be at the office or at home. That can lead to the “super stressed out” spikes, which then leads to productivity interruptions. Yes, even for those who claim that they thrive in high stress environments or moments, stress spikes interrupt their productivity. Stress can, and often does, wipe out concentration, makes us irritable or depressed, and harms both personal and professional relationships. Over time, those stress moments will weaken the immune system which can make us susceptible to a wide variety of illnesses like colds, headaches, body aches, heart disease, and so on.

Yes, it is true, we need a certain level or amount of stress to push us and help us perform at our best. But, the key is to manage that stress in work and life with one special word = BALANCE. Achieving a healthy work-life balance is an attainable goal for everyone, but workers and businesses will see rewards when that healthy balance is achieved. When a worker is balanced in their work-life relationship, they are more productive, take fewer days off of work, and will more-than-likely stay at/in their job.

Here are some ways that we can take to help loosen the grip of stress and move toward balance at work.

- Set manageable (aka realistic) daily goals each day. When we meet priorities, we feel a sense of accomplishment. That accomplishment feeds our dopamine system – an internal reward system – and can improve our mood, make us feel good, and lighten the stress that could have come on.
- Be efficient with work time. We all procrastinate from time-to-time, even at work. But when we do, the task that we are pushing off often grows and grows until we feel overwhelmed. So when you have a big project or task to tackle, divide it into smaller tasks leading up to the final project deadline. Complete the first task before the second. The less time you spend procrastinating or doing things just to appear busy, the more productivity you can achieve and more time with outside interests, family or friends can happen.
- Take a break! Breaks, even though we all tend to think of them as bad, are actually good and should be encouraged by employers. Small breaks during the day, during projects, etc. will help clear heads, making a worker’s ability to deal with stress and making good decisions attainable.
- Tune in. Sometimes having your favorite music playing while you work can help with concentration, stress reduction, and even stimulate creativity. Even studies that date back more than 30 years show that music in our every day life can have essential benefits, including lowering blood pressure.
- Communicate effectively. Be honest with your coworkers or your boss when you feel stressed or in a bind. One thing to remember here – do not complain. Suggest alternatives that are practical and realistic.
- Finally, give yourself a break! No one is perfect. Allow yourself some grace...you are human...do the best you can.

Work will always be there in the morning. Home life will not and moments can and do get missed because we live in a world that has placed so much value on being the best at our jobs. And in order to be the best at it, we must work constantly. Balance is possible and very much needed for our mental wellness.

Beavers Give First Half Scare to Indy Pirates

The Beavers finished up their fall semester by traveling across the state to take on the Indy Pirates. The Pirates entered the game coming off a week where they dropped their first conference loss against Cowley College and dropped out of the NJCAA Top 25 ranking. Pratt was looking to end their semester with a win, but also a big upset over a previous ranked team.

The Beavers came out fired up and ready to play as sophomore Christy Wiebe keep the game close with several three point baskets in the first half. At the end of the first quarter Indy was only up by two points and held a four point advantage at the end of the first half 30-26. In the third quarter, the Pirates came out on fire and scored 23 points and then put up an addition 31 points in the fourth quarter. The Beavers couldn't keep up with the Pirates and ended up losing 84-49.

Wiebe lead the team with 19 points and had 6 rebounds. Sophomore Chariah Daniels had 11 points and 9 rebounds. Both sophomores Cassie Onwugbufor and Karolina Juresiute rounding out the Beavers scoring with 9 points. The Pirates had five players shot in double digits and outrebounded the Beavers 44-30.

Beavers Win First KJCCC Road Game

The Pratt Community College (PCC) men's basketball team had one thing standing in their way from winter break. That was a trip to Independence Community College (ICC) to battle the Pirates. Indy was coming off of a 20 point victory over Coffeyville at home. The Beavers entered the game on a two game win streak, but had yet to win a Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference (KJCCC) game on the road. The stage was set for a battle in the ICC Fieldhouse in front of a small, but mighty crowd.

The game started with both teams taking shots back and fourth in a very physical matchup. The Beavers started pulling away late in the first half and went into halftime with a ten point lead 41-31 over the Pirates. PCC had a 14 point lead at the 16:54 mark in the second half, but that did not stop the Pirates from roaring back into the game. Indy took a one point lead with 2:08 left to go in the game. As the case has been in the past four games, the Beavers won off of free throws late in the game 79-77. The Pirates outscored the Beavers 46-38 in the second half. The score was tied three times and the lead changed twice over the course of the game.

Freshman forward Cam Morris had 25 points and 11 rebounds in the game and went 6 of 9 from the free throw line. Sophomores Nasan Ayala and Harrison Eghan both scored over ten points for the Beavers. Ayala had 20 points and Eghan had 11 points including two clutch free throws down the stretch.

In addition, sophomore Tommy Thomas went 6 of 6 from the free throw line and ended the game with 8 points. For the Pirates, sophomore Jordan Clark lead the team with 21 points and had 8 rebounds.

The Beavers finish their fall semester on a three game winning streak and brought their conference record back to .500.

Five international students attending Pratt Community College (PCC) shared holiday traditions in their native countries. Let's take an overseas tour with them!

Svenja Arnold gave an interesting account of holiday customs in her native Switzerland. Christmas is an important holiday there. There is a tree, and there are presents as well. The whole family celebrates together, usually on December 24th. "It is all about the family, and of course, food!", she said. One of the main dishes she mentioned is Raclette. This is described online as cheese being heated and the melting part being shaved off onto certain types of food, such as meat, or vegetables. Apparently, sweets are not emphasized; the focus is on the main dishes. Laughing, she told us, "Of course, ice cream is always included!"

When asked about chocolate, more laughter ensued. She admitted that chocolate is a big thing in Switzerland, especially Toblerone. It's shape is thought to represent the Matterhorn Mountain. However, at Christmas, chocolate is thought of more as a gift to give, rather than eating it.

Christmastime weather is snowy- "real winter", as she says. From central Switzerland, in a valley area with mountains on both sides, Svenja does like it here, saying it's good to see something different. She does miss the mountains though!

This Swiss miss is majoring in Health and Physical Education and is on the PCC soccer team. She will go home for summer and winter breaks. When asked about homesickness, she replied that there's no time to be homesick, between school and soccer. "My team is like my family here... I'm in good hands here."
