KANSAS PROMISE SCHOLARSHIP FUND SPECIFICS:

- 1. Last dollar scholarship which applies after all other federal aid and any outside scholarships are subtracted from the student's bill.
- 2. Pays for tuition, fees, books, and supplies for up to an associate degree.

 Allows the student to attend community college without cost except for any room and board costs they may incur.
- 3.\$10,000,000 across the state available and has been already appropriated for FY 22 and FY 23 to fund the program.

ELIGIBLE STUDENTS/ INCOME LIMITS:

(Student can attend full or part-time (At least 6 hours per semester) and complete program of study within 30 months.)

- 1. A Kansas resident who has graduated from an accredited Kansas public or a private secondary school (or Kansas homeschool) within the preceding 12 months.
- 2. A Kansas resident who has been in KS three or more consecutive years and who is at least 21 years of age or older.
- 3. A dependent child of military servicemember permanently stationed in another state & graduated in the last 12 months.
- 4. All eligible students must have family household income equal to \$100,000 or less for a family of two, \$150,000 or less for a family of three and, for household sizes above three, a household income that is equal to or less than the family of three amount plus \$4,800 for each additional family member. If scholarship moneys remain in the Kansas promise scholarship program fund during the award year after awarding all other scholarships pursuant to this section, Kansas promise scholarships may be awarded to eligible students whose family household income exceeds such amounts.

STUDENT OBLIGATIONS FOR ACCEPTING A KANSAS PROMISE SCHOLARSHIP:

- 1. Complete the FASFA.
- 2. Complete the Kansas Promise Scholarship Application
- 3. Enter into an agreement to live AND work in Kansas for two years post certificate or degree completion. Can delay the obligation if pursuing a bachelor's degree. If the student fails to fulfil scholarship requirements the amount of the scholarship must be paid back plus interest.
- 4. Maintain satisfactory academic progress (SAP) and complete program of study within 30 months of first receiving the Kansas Promise Scholarship.

Electrical Power Technology

PCC Offers Summer Session CDL Class for EPT Students

It is a requirement for Electrical Power Technology (EPT) students to obtain a Class A Commercial Driver's License as they study to become a lineman. This type of license is required in order to operate utility trucks and trailers out in the field. Students ordinarily earn their CDL during the regular semester, while also handling a full course load plus potential activities and athletics.


For the first time, students are able to take advantage of this offering over the summer, to focus solely on fulfilling the driving requirements before entering the EPT program. EPT Instructor Jeff Hoffman sees the class as a big benefit to those who are able to invest the time.

"Taking this class over the summer will reduce their workload during the school year. This is a class that will be offered in the future to our EPT students, maybe even during the school year. Depending on class size, this course can be completed in 4-6 weeks."


After a period of classroom instruction, students will take the written test at the DMV to earn a Learner's Permit. They can then practice driving skills at PCC over a period of a few weeks, then take the official driving test with the DMV to earn the Class A CDL.

The Summer CDL class is only offered to Pratt Community College students enrolled in the EPT program. It is not open to the public.



PCC Statement Regarding ADN Nursing Program

At the June 16 quarterly meeting of the Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN), Pratt Community College (PCC) Administration was notified that the conditional approval of the PCC Associate Degree Nursing Program (ADN) has been withdrawn. This means that PCC is no longer approved to teach the ADN Nursing Program effectively immediately. This action is primarily a result of PCC consistently not meeting the state required pass rates of the National Council Licensure Examination-RN (NCLEX), which states that a minimum of 75% of students taking the test must pass the NCLEX on their first attempt. PCC has fallen short of this mark in four of the last five years.

In anticipation of this possibility, PCC Administration has been in conversations with an area community college about delivering the ADN curriculum on the PCC campus. Following this decision by KSBN, these conversations will intensify in an attempt to ensure the ADN Program will continue to be offered in our area.

Incoming ADN students and internal stakeholders have been notified of the KSBN decision.

"Obviously, we are very disappointed with the decision made by the Kansas State Board of Nursing," Pratt Community College President Dr. Michael Calvert said. "We were hoping to be allowed to teach the program one more year and then work with a community college partner to deliver the program here in Pratt. Concern over the ADN Program has been an on-going situation for several years, and the college has put forth great effort and resources in attempt to regain the quality of our ADN Program. We are disappointed that we were not successful, but we remain hopeful that a partner can be secured to teach this program starting in 2022."

The action taken on June 16th by KSBN has no effect on the PCC Licensed Practical Nursing Program (LPN). The LPN Program has full five-year approval from KSBN with solid NCLEX outcomes, which consistently hit 90%. This action does not affect the PCC Pre-Nursing Program.

PCC Adds eSports as NJCAA-Sanctioned Event

PRATT, Kan.- As the world of eSports has evolved, so too has Pratt Community College. The Beavers athletic department has announced the school's current eSports team, formerly a club activity, will now be recognized as an NJCAA-sanctioned sport.

"We are excited to bring eSports under the athletics umbrella," said Pratt Community College athletic director Tim Swartzendruber. "With NJCAA now sponsoring eSports, it makes sense for us. Chris Nelson has done a great job of starting and building a successful eSports program here at PCC. We look forward to continuing that success."

Nelson, who has been the head coach of the school's eSports team since 2018, sees the move as simply a sign of the times.

"eSports moving under the athletics umbrella feels like a natural transition and inevitable materialization," said Nelson. "eSports has become an inescapable part of the collegiate environment, growing at an unprecedented pace. I am excited to join the program with the exceptional athletic programs at PCC."

Nelson previously spent seven years in charge of IT compliance and production at an oil company. Before that, he had owned a photography business, in which he was in charge of nine employees at one point. He also held the hat of a software consultant for Innovative Computing Corporation, a company that wrote software for transportation such as shipping for trucks, airlines, and railroads across the United States and Canada.

eSports, otherwise known as competitive, organized gaming, joins men's and women's tennis as newly-added athletic events to Pratt's athletic offerings. More details regarding the team and its logistics will be available soon.

The History of America's Independence Day

"Taxation without representation!" was the battle cry in America's 13 Colonies, which were forced to pay taxes to England's King George III despite having no representation in the British Parliament. As dissatisfaction grew, British troops were sent in to quell the early movement toward rebellion. Repeated attempts by the Colonists to resolve the crisis without military conflict proved fruitless.

On June 11, 1776, the Colonies' Second Continental Congress met in Philadelphia and formed a committee whose express purpose was drafting a document that would formally sever their ties with Great Britain. The committee included Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston. Jefferson, who was considered the strongest and most eloquent writer, crafted the original draft document (as seen above). A total of 86 changes were made to his draft and the Continental Congress officially adopted the final version on July 4, 1776.

The following day, copies of the Declaration of Independence were distributed, and on July 6, The Pennsylvania Evening Post became the first newspaper to print the extraordinary document. The Declaration of Independence has since become our nation's most cherished symbol of liberty.

Bonfires and Illuminations

On July 8, 1776, the first public readings of the Declaration were held in Philadelphia's Independence Square to the ringing of bells and band music. One year later, on July 4, 1777, Philadelphia marked Independence Day by adjourning Congress and celebrating with bonfires, bells and fireworks.

The custom eventually spread to other towns, both large and small, where the day was marked with processions, oratory, picnics, contests, games, military displays and fireworks. Observations throughout the nation became even more common at the end of the War of 1812 with Great Britain.

In June of 1826, Thomas Jefferson sent a letter to Roger C. Weightman, declining an invitation to come to Washington, D.C. to help celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. It was the last letter that Jefferson, who was gravely ill, ever wrote. In it, Jefferson says of the document:

"May it be to the world, what I believe it will be ... the signal of arousing men to burst the chains ... and to assume the blessings and security of self-government. That form, which we have substituted, restores the free right to the unbounded exercise of reason and freedom of opinion. All eyes are opened, or opening, to the rights of man. ... For ourselves, let the annual return of this day forever refresh our recollections of these rights, and an undiminished devotion to them."

- Thomas Jefferson June 24, 1826 Monticello

Congress established Independence Day as a holiday in 1870, and in 1938 Congress reaffirmed it as a paid holiday for federal employees. Today, communities across the nation mark this major midsummer holiday with parades, firework displays, picnics and performances of "The Star-Spangled Banner" and marches by John Philip Sousa.
