What brought you to PCC?

"Living in the dorms is different and a big change, but a good thing is that you have the opportunity to be by yourself if you want or if you want to be by others then you can always find someone around. I used to work in small towns and getting to know the people in a small town is different."

What advice would you give to future students?

"Show up to class. I have already had days that I just didn't want to go, but really should have, especially with the EPT program. The EPT process is also complicated and I thank my aunt for helping me with the process. Make sure to get your dorm paperwork in as early as possible."



Everything happens for a reason. Cathy Blasi began working for Pratt Community College in 1982 as the switchboard operator. The switchboard used to be housed in the location of the current HR office and included an eightline system and intercom.

After 3 years, the board approved a new Nursing Program and Cathy transitioned to the Nursing Secretary position, and was in that position for 17 years. In 1999, she came up to the Administrative Assistant to the Vice President of Instruction position and has been there ever since.

Today Cathy's daily tasks include tackling emails, checking Mrs. DePew's calendar, curriculum updates, academic scheduling, and program updates for KBOR. "It is a new day everyday, you never know what the day will bring", Cathy shares.



Through many building, staffing, and faculty changes, the starkest change Cathy shares is the "technology and computers."

Cathy recalls her fondest memory to date was the graduates of a nursing class presented her with a homemade quilt at the pinning ceremony, it left a lasting impression.

Going on 42 years with PCC, Cathy says the Students are what has kept her here for so long. "Everything I do contributes to the student's academic experience."

Cathy shares that her words of advice to others is to "have patience with yourself and others."

Throughout life, Cathy has had many memorable events. Her most memorable experience outside of PCC would have to be when she and her husband were working to rebuild a nature trail in the Colorado Rocky Mountains. When transporting dynamite and blasting caps up a lift, the chain broke and she was stuck on the side of a mountain when an electrical storm rolled in. With a few minutes to spare the lift was fixed and she was back to safety.

In her spare time, she spends time in the country with her farm cats and wandering wildlife. Cathy has also aspired to be a famous author of murder mystery novels.

Carmen Forest

Carmen Forest has had one exciting ride. In August of 1984, two weeks after closing ceremonies of the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics. She was visiting a friend and family and received a call about a job at Pratt Community College. The Head Volleyball and Basketball position had opened up. She interviewed over the phone and was offered the position by 3pm the same day.

Carmen held the Volleyball coach position for 3 years and the basketball coach for 4 years. She also held the Interim AD position in the Spring of 1986.

Once the health and wellness program curriculum was developed Carmen moved to her current faculty position.

Carmen Forest was an inaugural member of the US Women's Handball Team, who started training in 1976 and was dubbed one of the "Warlords" that stayed with the team through the 1984 Olympics. As there were no other handball teams in the US to practice with, she and the team were able to travel the world to train and practice. Their handball team placed 5th at the Olympics.

Since her Olympic debut, Carmen has also run 26 marathons in the US and Canada, including 2 Boston Marathons. She was named a Pikes Peak 'Skyrunner' for her 16 consecutive years of attending the Pikes Peak marathon. Carmen was also part of the 1996 Olympic torch run and attended the event.

Carmen shares that now she gets to share all of her wonderful experiences with the students. She has a love for the students and connects and stays connected throughout the years. "Students have definitely changed", shares Carmen with changes in entitlement and student diversity.

Carmen shares that going on 40 years here at PCC, "the small town, the family atmosphere, and seeing the students come back to work here" has kept her grounded in Pratt, Ks.

Remember to "Believe in yourself, be true to yourself." Carmen shares. "It has been a blessing to move to Pratt, KS, this is my family, these are my people".

Special thanks to everyone who showed their support. We love being involved in our community!!



2024-2025 FAFSA Changes

The FAFSA Simplification Act was initiated as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021. This large-scale update to the federal aid system aims to ultimately make the process more straight forward and accessible for students and families. In the short term, it means significant changes to the application and awarding process, starting with the 2024-25 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

The Office of Student Financial Aid is leading efforts on campus to help students and parents through these changes, which include a redesigned FAFSA form with fewer questions, direct retrieval of IRS information, and expanded access to Federal Pell grants.

Visit https://prattcc.edu/financial-information/financial-aid later this fall for best practices and important dates for filing the 2024-25 FAFSA, which can be completed at studentaid.gov. Students may also estimate their federal financial aid at studentaid.gov/aid-estimator. For questions, please call 1-800-4-FED-AID (1-800-433-3243).

Important Dates for 2024-25

Late-Dec. 2023: 2024-25 FAFSA form available to students (two months later than usual timing)

Changes with Filing the 2024-25 FAFSA

<u>Authentication Requirements</u>

All contributors to the FAFSA must be authenticated using a Federal Student Aid ID (FSA ID).

 Users who have not previously completed a FAFSA and still need to create an FSA ID should do so as soon as possible at studentaid.gov. To obtain an FSA ID, users will need a social security number (SSN) or undergo a knowledge-based match to validate their identity.

Parent Invitations to Complete FAFSA

Students will complete their section of the FAFSA first, then indicate which parent(s) should be invited via email to complete their parts of the FAFSA:

- One parent (if single parent) or if parents are married and filed joint 2022 tax returns.
- Two parents (if parents married, filed separately in 2022).
- For other parent situations not listed above, refer to the FAFSA for instructions.

Contributors Must ProvideConsent and Sign FAFSA

All students and parent(s) contributing to the FAFSA must provide consent on the 2024-25 FAFSA to have their 2022 tax information released from the IRS to the Department of Education.

- Contributors must use their FSA ID to accessthe FAFSA form, answer questions, provide consent, and sign the form electronically.
- The FAFSA will not be submittedfor processing until ALL contributors provide consent and sign.
- Consent to releasing tax information cannot be revoked and is mandatory for the Student Aid Index (SAI) calculation to be completed and for the student to be eligible for federal aid.
 - Students or parents who are non-tax filers must still provide consent and enter income data manually.



FINANCIAL APAFSA

What else is new?

Diving deeper into the new FAFSA process.

<u>Understandingthe Student Aid Index</u>

Expected Family Contribution (EFC) is being replaced with the Student Aid Index (SAI), which is the result of a processed FAFSA and is used for packaging financial aid. Things to note on the SAI for 2024-25:

- Two New Calculations: Separate calculations are now utilized for determining SAI and Pell Grant eligibility, with new data elements being used in each formula.
- Multiple Family Members in College: Having multiple family members in college is no longer factored into the calculation of the SAI.
- Farm and Small Business Reporting Requirements: Details such as net worth of farms (excluding primary residences) and small businesses are now required to be reported.
- Asset Information: There are new rules to determine who is exemptfrom providing asset information. These rules are based on AGI, tax filing status, and if they are a recipient of a means-tested federal benefit program in the prior two calendar years (2022 or 2023).
- No Alternative SAI: The SAI for a student will be the same if enrolled for fall only or for the entire year. There is no change to the SAI if enrolled for less than nine months.

Federal Pell Grants

Students will now be considered for one of three types of Pell Grants: maximum, minimum, or a calculated Pell amount. Eligibility is now based on dependency status, family size, parent's marital status, income (AGI), a multiplier of the federal poverty level, and enrollment status. All students enrolled for at least one credit hour will now receive consideration for a Pell Grant.

Special Considerations

- New Provisional Independent Status: If a dependent student indicates they have unusual circumstances that prevent them from providing parent data, they will have their FAFSA processed with a provisional independent status. The student must provide documentation to financial aid administrators to determine if the student should be considered independent.
- Professional Judgements: A new requirement states financial aid offices must publicly share that students have the option to pursue a professional judgment adjustment on a case-by-case basis. There are several occasions when an adjustment may be needed, such as when there are changes to a parent's income or cost of attendance increases from a study-abroad experience.

What to Expect

As we transition to the revamped FAFSA, we anticipate potential processing delays and increased questions about the FAFSA. While many Pell Grant recipients may receive a similar amount as they did in 2023-24, others could be eligible for the first time. Students with multiple family members in college or who own a farm or small business may be the most impacted by this year's changes. We will work with these families to navigate the transition and review any financial aid offers significantly different from last year. As always, it is critical for students and families applying for financial aid to pay attention to important dates and deadlines. Refer to studentaid.gov for questions about FAFSA Simplification and to estimate a student's federal financial aid.



It provides a crucial opportunity to educate people about the risk factors for diabetes, the importance of a healthy lifestyle, and the management of the disease.

Key Facts

- Over 37 million children and adults in the United States have diabetes
- 96 million American adults have prediabetes
- 1.4 million Americans are diagnosed with diabetes every year
- Nearly half of American adults have diabetes or prediabetes

Diabetes in the United States

- 37.3 million Americans or 11.3% of the population have diabetes; that's 1 in 10 Americans
- 28.7 million Americans have diagnosed diabetes
- 8.5 million Americans have undiagnosed diabetes
- 1.4 million Americans aged 18 years or older are newly diagnosed with diabetes each year, one every 23 seconds
- Age 18 years or older: 14.7% of all people in this age group have diabetes
- 15.9 million, or about 1 in 3 adults age 65 or older, have diabetes

PCC Fortnite Team Off to a Good Start

The Beaver Esports Fortnite team has been busy playing two matches a week in both the NJCAAE Fortnite Build and No Build open series. The team consisting of Christopher 'whitababy03' Whitaker and Samuel

'windexcrow' Kelly have a current record of 2-2 in both series. The team plays every Monday (nobuild) and Tuesday (build) at 5:30 pm in the Esports Areana on campus.

The season started on September 12 with their first match in the build series against Johnston Community College and lost 2-0. They also lost in the build series 2-0 against Louisberg College on September 19. One of their wins comes from a bye week while the second win comes against Spoon River College a come from behind 2-1 victory.

In the no build series, the team defeated Spoon River College 2-0 and SUNY Jefferson Team C 2-1 and lost to both Team A and B from SUNY Jefferson 2-0. The team is sitting in 17th place in the nobuild standings out of 40 teams. For the build series the team is sitting in the middle 12th.

"I am proud of the Fortnite team as they have started the season well and have played extremely competitively. They have put themselves in a good position to make a run over the next month to qualify for the playoffs," said Charles Keefer Head Esports Coach. "Both Chris and Sam put in a lot of work on the game outside of practice and matches. Chris is close to the highest rank a Fortnite player can achieve."

The team will compete in matches through the end of November and hope to qualify for post season play. They will also start competing in the Wildcat League and local league made up of other Kansas and Nebraska community colleges and universities. The matches begin October 23, and the teams advancing to the league semifinals will play December 2nd at Kansas State University for the fall championship.



Women's Soccer Ends Season at Central

The Beaver women's soccer team wrapped up their 2023 season on October 18 on the road at Central Community College in Columbus, NE. The team finished the season 3-9-4 overall and 2-8-2 in conference play. Two conference wins came against Southeast Community College.

Game Recap

In a thrilling women's soccer match, Central emerged victorious with a 3-1 win over Pratt. The game displayed impressive performances from both teams, but Central strong second-half display secured them the victory. The first half saw the Beavers take an early lead with a goal from Rosina Mastro, assisted by Madeline Martinez. Despite several attempts from both teams, Pratt held onto their 1-0 advantage heading into halftime.

The Raiders came out determined in the second half and quickly equalized the score in the 55th minute. Abby Berger found the back of the net, assisted by Lilli Reiser, leveling the playing field at 1-1. Central took the lead in the 65th minute with a goal from Ellie Bates, courtesy of Jada Cohn's assist. The team's scored again in the 75th minute when Francesa Wright scored, assisted by Talia Gisonni, extending the lead to 3-1.

For Pratt, goalkeeper <u>Marcie Greenawalt</u> put in a commendable performance, making two saves despite conceding three goals. <u>Rosina Mastro</u>'s early goal highlighted her attacking prowess. Central's Jada Cohn played a crucial role in the team's victory, providing an assist for Ellie Bates' goal. Lilli Reiser and Talia Gisonni also contributed assists, while Abby Berger and Francesa Wright both scored.

Season Recap

Freshman Rosina Mastro lead the team with eight goals on 26 shots and 17 total points in 12 games. Both Yvie Miller and Laila Ortiz-Nolan lead the team with four assists. Yvie had 2 goals with eight points on the season and Laila had four goals with 12 points. In the goalie box, freshman Kaylee Farmer lead the team with 28 saves on 8 goals allowed. Farmer ended the season 1-3-2 in the box. While Macie Greenawalt had four saves with seven goals allowed and ended the year 1-1-1. Overall, the team scored 22 goals in 15 games with 19 assists.









Men's Soccer Wraps up Season at Central

The Beaver men's soccer team wrapped up their 2023 season on October 18 on the road at Central Community College in Columbus, NE. The team finished their season 4-10-1 overall and 3-9 in conference play with conference wins over Allen County and Hesston College.

Game Recap

In the first half, Central Community Co took an early lead with a goal from Donovan Williams at the 17-minute mark. Both teams displayed solid defensive performances, with Central's goalkeeper making two saves. Pratt's goalkeepers, <u>Joao Ferreira</u>, and <u>Brandon Bumgarner</u> made nine saves throughout the game.

Season Recap

Sophomore Gustavo Dias Juliani lead the team with nine goals off 18 shots this season with 19 points. Lucas

<u>Barcelos</u> lead the team with six assists and had three shots on goal for 12 points. In the goalies' box, <u>Brandon Bumgarner</u> lead the squad with 65 saves and 23 goals allowed and ended the season with a 4-7-1 record. Freshman goalkeeper <u>Joao Ferreira</u> had 20 saves with two goals allowed for a 0-2-0 record. Overall, the team scored 22 goals in 15 games with 16 assists.





Cross Country Team Wraps up Season at NJCAA Region VI/KJCCC Championships

The Beaver cross country team competed at the NJCAA Region VI/KJCCC Championships on Friday, October 27th in Iola, KS. The men's team had three runners compete with freshman <u>Achilles Matchers</u> leading the pack with a time of 30:54.5 and



<u>Antonio Griffin</u> trailing not too far behind with a time of 30:58.9. Sophomore <u>Jace Baker</u> finished his last cross-country race in a Beaver uniform with a time of 33:50.5. On the women's side, two runners competed, with <u>Madison Butler</u> leading the pack with a time of 22:57.5 with <u>Jaeli Deel</u> coming across the finish line with 25:29.3.

The team competed at five meets including the October 27th meet. They started their season at the Terry Masterson Twilight Classic in Hutchinson, KS. The team then traveled to the Missouri Southern Stampede in Joplin, MO followed by the Chile Pepper Cross Country Festival in Fayetteville, AR. The team finished the season with two trips to Iola, KS first to compete at the Firestarter Classic on October 14.





CONCEPTS AND APPLICATIONS OF THE EXERCISE SCIENCES

HPR 123 - PRATT ONLINE - 1E 12/13/23 - 01/03/24 3 CREDIT HOURS

This course presents key topics and current research in exercise physiology, biochemistry, anatomy, bio-mechanics, endocrinology, sport nutrition, and sport psychology and discusses applications for the design of safe and effective strength and conditioning programs. A physical education course that is designed to provide the student with a combination of lectures that are research-based and accurate of the essentials of strength and conditioning and extensive exercise techniques that will prepare the student for the CSCS, NSCA exams, and USAW Level 1 Sports Performance Coaching Course. This course is recommended for current/future athletes, teachers, coaches, administrators, officials and/or others involved in recreational or competitive activities and human performance.

PSYCHOLOGY OF SPORT

HPR 125 - PRATT ONLINE - 1E 12/13/23 - 01/03/24 3 CREDIT HOURS

The course provides an opportunity to become acquainted with the many psychological aspects that coaches, athletes, and spectators face in their involvement with sports. Emphasis will be given on the psychological and social dimensions of coaching, practice and competitive preparation, and on the psychological traits common to specific sports and athlete personality. Psychology of Sport is a physical education course designed to provide the student with an understanding of the issues related in sport today. This course is recommended for current/future athletes, teachers, coaches, administrators, officials and/or others involved in recreational or competitive activities and human performance.
