



One of Kim Goodnight's favorite road trip destinations is Pratt Community College in Pratt, KS.

Goodnight is the Regional Manager of Community Affairs with ITC Great Plains. He rewards two student scholarships on behalf of ITC, and travels to meet with all of the students in the program.

"We need people to stay in Kansas, we do. If you look at the job force in our electrical field, you'll see there's almost 60% getting close to retirement age. So there needs to be that influx of new, trained and educated work force to be able to step in, and that's what PCC is doing here."

ITC has held a relationship with PCC for more than a decade. EPT Director Dave Campbell likes that the scholarships allow him to raise the bar for his students.

"We select students that are stand-outs and for their hard work and their dedication to their classes and we want them to be the best of the best. It's very expensive to go to school and train and many of them are non-traditional students that have families and they're trying to make ends meet while they're doing this training, so we appreciate the help."

The scholarships were awarded to EPT students Jacob Benham and Jacob Miller.

"It has helped me immensely with paying for school and everything, I mean I didn't come from a very wealthy family, and I've been living on my own for a long time. So that extra money really helped me focus on my studies rather than having to focus on going to work and things like that. I was able to just do what I needed to do to get good grades here. Kansas Promise Scholarship Provides Tuition, Fees, Cost of Books for Pratt Community College Eligible Programs

The Kansas Promise Scholarship Act, announced by Governor Laura Kelly on April 23rd provides scholarships for students attending Pratt Community College and other eligible postsecondary institutions in Kansas for any two-year associate degree program, career and technical education certificate, or stand-alone program otherwise identified by the Kansas Board of Regents. Eligible programs at Pratt Community College are: Welding, Electrical Power Technology, Automotive Technology, Modern Distribution Sales & Management, Nursing. CNA, and Information Networking Technology. The scholarship is available starting Fall 2021 and covers an aggregate amount of tuition, required fees, and the cost of books and required materials for the eligible program.

"We are very excited about the prospect for the new "Promise Act" benefitting Kansans in workforce programs. I hope this spurs recent high school graduates as well as adults looking to further enhance or change their career path into one of the high paying, high demand, critical need programs that the Promise Act targets," said college president Dr. Michael Calvert. "I want to thank Governor Kelly and the Kansas State Legislators, especially our local representatives, for their foresight to invest in the Kansas workforce."

Calvert also wants to recognize Kansas Association of Community College Trustees Executive Director, Heather Morgan, who worked tirelessly to see this through to fruition. He stated that Pratt Community College is ready to assist students in the process of applying for and receiving this scholarship.

The scholarship is available to a Kansas resident who has graduated from an accredited Kansas public or private secondary school or Kansas homeschool within the preceding 12 months or an individual who is 21 years of age or older and has been a resident of Kansas for three or more consecutive years. Also eligible is a dependent child of a military service member permanently stationed in another state and who, within the preceding 12 months, graduated from any out-of-state secondary school or obtained a high school equivalency certificate.

Students must complete a scholarship application, enter into a Kansas Promise Scholarship agreement, complete the FASFA, and enroll in an eligible postsecondary educational institution in a promise eligible program. Eligible student family income limits are applicable. Additional requirements do apply, including agreeing to live and work in Kansas two years post completion of their two-year degree or certificate.

House Bill 2064, signed last week by Governor Kelly established the scholarship program that honors her administration's promise to invest in Kansas students and businesses. "I want to thank the Legislature for working with me, in a bipartisan fashion, to ensure Kansas students have access to the resources they need to succeed and build a robust pipeline of skilled workers to support future economic growth," she said.

Senator Molly Baumgardner, Senate Education Chair, said the Promise Act Scholarships will be transformative for Kansas families and those currently without work and the under-employed will receive the skills training they need for Kansas jobs that are in high demand and offer solid wages.

MENTAL HEALTH MINUTE



Remember – It Is Okay to Take a Break from Work

We all need to take breaks from time to time, however, many of us struggle to leave work for those necessary breaks. Regardless of if we plan to take a vacation, a staycation, or any other variation of one, it is important -and OKAY- to take a break from the job, from the routine, and from the regular demands of life. It helps us to keep our stress levels in check.

Unfortunately, many of us cannot just simply take a break from our jobs. Getting a little personal history in here, I grew up with a city department head as a Dad. He was committed to his work because he was truly passionate about what he did. It made it tough for him to leave, even though we took regular family vacations every year. Even before cell phones or the Internet, he always left a number where he could be reached because -inevitably- a catastrophe would happen while he was away. Though it bothered my Mom, I always admired his dedication to his craft. And, especially now in the career I love to do, find myself not fully "checking out" when I should or need to.

Here is something crucial for all of us to acknowledge and understand – it is NOT shirking responsibilities to take those breaks. They are much-needed (check back at the last sentence in the first paragraph for a critical reason). We are not designed to allow prolonged stress come at us repeatedly and regularly; even those of us who would like to think we can handle it. Our bodies and -in my opinion, most importantly- our minds are not meant to do that. Chronic stress can lead to a lot of real health problems ranging from frequent headaches to high blood pressure to anxiety and so on. Even positive events, during times of chronic stress, can feel overwhelming and sometimes lead us to flip the auto-pilot switch to ON.

The benefits of much-need time away exceed the reduction in stress levels. It also is good to rest because we can restore ourselves both physically and mentally. We gain clearer thinking when we have lower stress levels and are well rested. And, what should not be a surprise, we also have increased productivity to our jobs, our relationships, our energy, and our lives in general.

Take the breaks. Turn off the notifications from work emails or social services like Teams. They will be there when we return. Take the vacations and enjoy the scenery – whether we travel or stay at home. Get the things once enjoyed outside of work back in sight. Even the shortest of times away can be valuable in restoration.

PCC Faculty Put on Science Show for Skyline 5th Graders

Physical Science instructor Paul Primrose created a science show when his oldest was in fifth grade. He was teaching at Baylor University in West, Texas at the time.

The grand finale at the show, inspired by Primrose's wife, was the creation of dry-ice ice cream and was met with hefty approval from this particular age group. Primose was inspired to do another Science Show recently, with the help of fellow science faculty and students.

"Getting to rope some H.S. students or college students into coming along has likely been my second greatest joy; we started doing this because it was a win-win situation. My students tested new parts of the show, worked out the kinks, and used all the critical thinking needed to pull off a good show."


Primrose headed to Skyline Schools to present the show to Hannah Barilla's fifth grade class.

"I am so glad that my two colleagues Jason Ghumm and Kip Chambers, along with a current PCC student Stephanie Holmes, were able to come along and meet about thirty 5th graders on the lawn in front of the skyline schools to do a quick 30-minute show. Our new finale was the implosion of a 55-gallon barrel in a novel way; to my knowledge it might be the first of its kind!" The Spring 2021 Fundamentals of Chemistry class at PCC helped develop and test the barrel implosion demonstration, which turned out to be the show's biggest attraction. The main ingredients? Hot Hands and peroxide.

"They used Chemistry to determine the amount of heat and gas generated in the needed chemical reaction, and they helped with the practical side; cutting 60 individual "Hot Hands" packets! In closing, our first show is in the books, I think it was a hit."

It was a big hit indeed, and it was hard to tell who had more fun. They didn't even need the ice cream.

"I enjoy science a lot, a new activity I have tried out this semester that I came to enjoy was the shooting sports class."

Do you have a favorite instructor or classmate at PCC?

"My favorite instructor would have to be Jason Ghumm, I've known him a for a while now and in his classes he always makes the learning fun."

What interests you about science?

"Learning about the different reactions, seeing that things in our everyday life can have the possiblilty of reacting with something."

Explain your involvement in the science demo at Skyline?

"My involvement was to answer questions that the students had to ask or explain the process."

What were the experiments performed at the demo? How did you help prepare for this?

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"The two experiments we performed were the implosion of a 55 gallon barrel and elephant toothpaste. Preparing for the implosion of the barrel, it was a lab experiment that we did in our college chemistry class, we did all the calculations and actually imploded a barrel. From this implosion we learned what we needed to fix and what we needed to leave the same, to make it more impressive for the skyline students."

What do you hope the Skyline 5th graders learn from this demo?

"I hope that they learned that science isn't always boring, you can have fun with the information you learn."

What are your future plans?

"My future plans are to graduate with an associates in biology from PCC in December, I am also currently planning on getting my EMT certification along with that.

How has PCC contributed to your success for the future?

"Being at PCC has helped me plan for my future, helping me get on the right track to get my degree."

Microbiology Students Hold Mini-Symposium in Library

PCC Microbiology students held a mini-symposium in the Linda Hunt Memorial Library to display what they learned during their research studies on antibiotics.

Science Instructor Jason Ghumm explains more about the project:

"Microbiology does a research project based on "Tiny Earth". This is a program out of the University of Wisconsin. The idea is that undergrads search for antibiotic producing bacteria with the hopes that they find some. They would then send them to UW where the bacteria would be researched further. If the bacteria still stand up to scrutiny, they would then be sent to pharmaceutical companies to produce new antibiotics.

At the end of the semester, we display our research on a poster and hold a mini symposium in the library for anyone to come look and ask questions."

Numbers for the symposium were kept small for social-distancing purposes, but students were able to answer a lot of questions about what they learned.

Covid-19 Update Mask Requirement

May 24, 2021

Effective May 24 through August 1st, face coverings are recommended, not required, to be worn throughout campus and in college vehicles unless physical/social distancing cannot be maintained. Campus facility capacities, other than classrooms, will be capped at 40% during the summer or through August 1. Classrooms will continue to maintain six-feet distancing and spaces arranged accordingly.

Pratt Community College continues to manage the risk of COVID-19 and diligently operate during a global pandemic; considering and responding to local, state, and national regulations and guidelines as appropriate. Employees, students, and campus visitors should be prepared to adapt quickly regarding changes with College services, operations, and processes as the College continues to minimize the risk of COVID-19 exposure. In addition, the delivery mode for courses other than online courses is subject to change. The health and safety of College stakeholders are our highest priority. Celebrating Pride Month

Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer (LGBTQ) Pride Month is currently celebrated each year in the month of June to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan. The Stonewall Uprising was a tipping point for the Gay Liberation Movement in the United States. In the United States the last Sunday in June was initially celebrated as "Gay Pride Day," but the actual day was flexible. In major cities across the nation the "day" soon grew to encompass a month-long series of events. Today, celebrations include pride parades, picnics, parties, workshops, symposia and concerts, and LGBTQ Pride Month events attract millions of participants around the world. Memorials are held during this month for those members of the community who have been lost to hate crimes or HIV/AIDS. The purpose of the commemorative month is to recognize the impact that lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals have had on history locally, nationally, and internationally.

In 1994, a coalition of education-based organizations in the United States designated October as LGBT History Month. In 1995, a resolution passed by the General Assembly of the National Education Association included LGBT History Month within a list of commemorative months. National Coming Out Day (October 11), as well as the first "March on Washington" in 1979, are commemorated in the LGBTQ community during LGBT History Month.

Rainbow Flag Symbolizes Pride

The first versions of the rainbow flag were flown on June 25, 1978, for the San Francisco Gay Freedom Day parade. Baker and a team of volunteers had made them by hand, and now he wanted to mass-produce the flag for consumption by all. However, because of production issues, the pink and turquoise stripes were removed and indigo was replaced by basic blue, which resulted in the contemporary six-striped flag (red, orange, yellow, green, blue, and violet). Today this is the most common variant of the rainbow flag, with the red stripe on top, as in a natural rainbow. The various colors came to reflect both the immense diversity and the unity of the LGBTQ community.

It was not until 1994 that the rainbow flag was truly established as the symbol for LGBTQ pride. That year Baker made a mile-long version for the 25th anniversary of the Stonewall riots. Now the rainbow flag is an international symbol for LGBTQ pride and can be seen flying proudly, during both the promising times and the difficult ones, all around the world.

Jeret Johnson to Lead Tennis Programs at Pratt

PRATT, Kan.- Following the announcement that men's and women's tennis would be returning to Pratt Community College this fall, the move to find a leader for both programs was swift and decisive. The Beavers have found their man.

During the 2021 spring semester, Jeret Johnson has been named the head coach of the adjacent tennis programs.

"We had a quality pool of candidates for the tennis position," said athletic director Tim Swartzendruber. "Jeret has great experience and local ties. "We felt he would be a great fit at PCC and we are excited to have him join our team. Now that we have added tennis, the Jayhawk Conference has four schools with tennis which allows us to have a Region Championship Meet. That is exciting for sure!"

Johnson, most recently an assistant coach at Florida Atlantic University in Boca Raton, Florida, is originally from Larned, Kansas. The Kansan's collegiate career began at Barton Community College, where Johnson was an Academic All-American. He eventually transferred to Fort Hays State and began his coaching career as a student assistant.

As was noted before, Johnson will be coming to Pratt after a year at Florida Atlantic, where he was responsible for recruiting, on-court strategy, and logistics. Johnson's collegiate coaching stops also include tenures at West Point and the University of Central Oklahoma. He also has experience at the high school level, specifically Larned High School, and was the in-house tennis pro at Highlands Country Club in Garrison, New York.

Johnson graduated from Fort Hays State Unviersity with a 3.94 GPA, earning a Bachelor of Science degree in health and human performance. He is certified by the Professional Tennis Registry and the United States

Joel Pearson named Track & Field Head Coach

PRATT, Kan.- Josh Campbell, who had led the Beavers track & field program for two seasons, has resigned from his position after accepting the head coaching job at Florida National University. Finding a replacement was a seamless process however, as current head cross country coach/assistant track & field coach Joel Pearson will direct the track & field program going forward.

"I am absolutely honored to lead the Track & Field program at Pratt Community College," said Pearson. "I would like to thank Dr. Michael Calvert and athletic director Tim Swartzendruber for accepting me into the Beaver family and allowing me to lead the program."

Swartzendruber commented on Pearson's in-house promotion, saying "We are fortunate we have someone with such strong track credentials as Coach Pearson already here at PCC. I am extremely happy and excited he has accepted the position as head track coach. He has done a great job in his short time with the cross country program and I am confident he will continue to build our track program as well."

Pratt's athletic director also thanked Campbell for his years of success at the helm of Beavers track & field.

"We appreciate what Coach Campbell has done for PCC track," said Swartzendruber. "He worked through a very challenging last 15 months with COVID and showed great dedication and commitment to Beaver athletics. We wish him the best in his future endeavor."

Pearson concluded his first season as head cross country coach in 2020-21, assisting in the development and coaching of Cross Country and Half-Marathon All-American Zach McPhee.

Before arriving in Pratt, Pearson had spent the previous two years as the Head Cross Country, Track & Field Coach at Mountlake Terrace High School (WA) where the Hawks saw two All-Americans, one State Champion, four school record holders, 25 state qualifiers, a fourth place finish at the WIAA State Cross Country Championships, and a national runner-up in Josh Beam (Steeplechase).

Before representing the Terrace Hawks, Pearson was the Head Cross Country, Assistant Track & Field Coach at Meridian Community College where he coached eight school record holders, 10 All-Americans, Men's National 4x8 Champions (NJCAA Championship Meet Record) and was a vital part of MCC placing fourth at the NJCAA Indoor National Championships.

Prior to Meridian Community College, Pearson worked as the Director of Track & Field, Cross Country at Cardinal Stritch University in Milwaukee, WI., where his athletes re-wrote the record books with 212 school records, 42 national qualifiers, 34 All-American Honors, a 4 x 800 Drake Relays champion, set an NAIA National Record in the DMR and saw national champions in Phoenix Miller, Supervoid Mack III, Jamal Namous, Jonathan Kiptum, Darryl Simpson, Camille Shiflett, and Daniel Garcia, the most decorated athlete in CSU athletic history. Garcia won multiple national championships, helped set a national record, and was a three-time Regional Athlete of the Year and two-time National Athlete of the Year.

As the Head Coach for Harrier Track Club, an Olympic development program, Pearson has coached many professional athletes, both international and domestic, to national success. Among those athletes are USA Champions, 12 Olympic Trials Qualifiers, and 14 Team USA Qualifiers who competed in the World Track & Field Championships, Pan-American Games, U23 NACAC Championships, Pan American Cup, World RW Championships, World Junior Cross, and World Junior Mountain. Most notably, Oliver Bear Don't Walk IV and Katie Burnett both set world bests in their respective events.

A native of Ferndale, Washington, Pearson holds a Bachelor of Arts degree with double majors in history and coaching from Evergreen State in Olympia and earned his Master of Science in Sport Management from Cardinal Stritch University in Milwaukee. Pearson is also an instructor for the USA Track & Field (USATF) for their Level 1 and Level 2 curriculums.

He is the son of former American 50-mile record holder and USA Champion Jim Pearson.

Pratt Defeats Central 2-0, Clinches Region VI Title Appearance

PRATT, Kan.- Earlier in the week, the Beavers traveled to Columbus, Nebraska to play the Central Community College Raiders where the Beavers were downed 3-1, halting a five-match winning streak. The Beavers found the perfect opportunity for revenge however, besting the Raiders 2-0 in the Region VI semifinals.

The Beavers were the more offensive side on Saturday, creating 16 shot opportunities, seven of which were on goal, while the Raiders managed only a single shot between the posts on their eight attempts.

Pratt's Nathan Lira opened the scoring only five minutes in. After a Central foul, Martin Cruz Soto lobbed a free kick deep down the left side of the Beavers formation, finding Lira. The Brazilian, seeing the Raiders keeper out of position, chipped a precise shot high and wide into the right side of the net to give the Beavers a quick 1-0 lead.

At the 20-minute mark, the Beavers struck again. A corner kick sent into the box was not cleared by the Central defense, as the ball bounced off both attackers and defenders before landing at the feet of Pratt's Saul Munoz. Munoz's intial attempt was saved by the keeper, though Ethan Hill, positioned in front of goalkeeper Antonio Jimenez, set the ball at his feet before sending a no-look, backwards shot into the corner of the net to extend the Beavers lead to 2-0.

While the Beavers managed 12 shots in the first-half, the home team saw only four shots sent towards goal in the final 45 minutes, as Kevin Kewley directed his team to play more defensively in order to protect the lead. The Beavers back line minimized the offensive attack from the Raiders, as Pratt goalie Rylan Walter's single save took place in the second-half.

Beavers Outlast Raiders in Penalty Shootout, Advance to Region VI Final



PRATT, Kan.- The #20 Beavers, hosting the program's first-ever postseason appearance, treated the abundance of fans at the Pratt Soccer/Track & Field Complex to quite the show. Following a scoreless 90 minutes, as well as two goal-less overtime periods, Pratt and the Central Community College Raiders ventured into an always-intense penalty shooutout. There, the Beavers proved their mettle, winning 7-6 in the winner-take-all shootout.

Over the course of the match's initial 90 minutes, the Beavers managed five shots on goal in 10 shots, while the Raiders saw seven of their 14 shots land between the posts. Per usual, Amaya Myers and Quemberli Merida led the Beavers attack, as the pair combined for eight of the team's 10 shot attempts. Pratt goalkeeper Paige Strausberg was perfect on the day, denying all seven shots on goal.

Though the Beavers were the more timid offensive side, Coach Burnett's team rose to the occasion when it mattered most. Following 110 minutes of scoreless action, the two teams leveraged their postseason hopes on penalty kicks.

Myers and Central's Laura Jovanovic both missed the opening tries, while Kassandra Ramos and Kaylee Grieser were successful for both sides in the second round of attempts. The Beavers' Svenja Arnold was successful in the team's third attempt, while Central's Sydney Weiler was off-target, setting up the Beavers for a winning chance. Merida found the back of the net in the fourth round of the shootout, and was matched by Elizabeth Massucci of Central.

Morgan Hamm approached the ball with the opportunity to seal the win, though her shot was denied by Raiders keeper Rachel Willette. Emily Fisher of the visiting side eventually scored after the Hamm miss, extending the penalty shootout. Both sides scored in rounds six, seven, and eight. Briana Zuniga of Pratt scored what was eventually the match-sealing penalty shot in round nine, as Central's Madison Garrow was unable to sneak her attempt past Strausberg. The win also marks the first and only postseason victory in Pratt women's soccer history.
