PCC Performing Arts Group Takes on Tennessee

Instructors, students and supporters of the Pratt Community College Performing Arts department took their annual end-of-year trip as the school year came to an end. This is the fifth year the department has organized this trip for students to Tennessee and surrounding areas for a week of music, entertainment, service and fun.



Twenty-five students and 8 adults, including PCC staff and supporters of the program, traveled from Pratt to Missouri and on to Tennessee making different stops along the way and doing what they do best, performing.

The group of students and adults began their trip on May 14 driving from Pratt to Independence, Mo. where they continued the tradition of sight-seeing along the way including the Superman statue in Metropolis, Mo.

The Tennessee trip continued with five days in Pigeon Forge, Gatlinburg and Memphis where they combined sight-seeing with live performances at tourist spots as well as an assisted-living facility.

"We sang an hour show at an assisted living facility where the kids helped the residents dance," said Beck. "Residents and students both enjoyed it a lot."

The group visited the popular Dollywood theme park to soak up some Blue Grass musical entertainment as well as a variety of other genres where they performed for guests at the park and played a "selfie" scavenger hunt throughout the park snapping photos of popular attractions and people.

They also performed at the popular Country Tonite Show in Pigeon Forge on stage in front of a good sized audience.

Travelling back home the group stopped in Memphis to visit Graceland and for dinner at King's Palace on Beale Street where they listened to some great blues by the resident musician and were also invited to perform for the crowd.

The PCC performing arts department organizes this annual trip with help from staff, faculty and the Pratt Community.

"We are so grateful to all of the wonderful individuals and businesses who have helped us this year by coming to our shows, participating in our fundraisers, donating money, sponsoring shirts, buying us food and supporting us through your positive thoughts and encouragement," said Beck.

Carol Bonham Awarded with PHEA Teacher of the Year

Pratt Community college has awarded their 2017 Pratt Higher Education Associations (PHEA) Teacher of the Year to Science Instructor, Carol Bonham. Fellow PCC instructor and PHEA Teacher of the Year award recipient in 2016, Dave Chambers, presented the award to Bonham at the PCC Commencement on Friday, May 12.

"It's an honor to receive this award," said Bonham. "Especially when it comes from your peers who I work with and respect very much."

Bonham just completed her 29th year at PCC. She began as an adjunct instructor and became full-time in 1991. Bonham teaches chemistry and geology which she has had an interest in since she was a child and is one of many teachers within her family.

"I love the spark you get when a student "gets" a concept that will help them reach their career goals," said Bonham. "Students share life experiences and begin to relate science concepts to those experiences."

PCC instructor of English and Literature, Monette DePew, nominated Bonham for the award because of her outstanding display of instruction to students.

"She sets high standards but first meets students at their skill level and then creates opportunities for students to meet those standards," said DePew. "By setting the mark high and her willingness to help students meet that mark she truly demonstrates outstanding instruction and a sincere visible concern for students."

Bonham says that her teaching philosophy is centered on the students. By giving them the tools they need to succeed and by sharing observations and experiences in a way they understand. Each semester Bonham says she changes up labs and assignments that emulate the culture of the classroom or what is happening in the world so that lessons don't become stale.

"I want each student, each class, to have a unique experience in my classroom," said Bonham.

"She varies her classroom presentations and assignments to better engage student interest and understanding," said DePew. "She works with students inside and out of the classroom. Her overall goal is student success."

Bonham said part of the reason she thinks she is successful is because of PCC's smaller environment. She says it's an asset to have a small classroom community and to have a faculty that is so close to each other.

Bonham serves on the Executive Committee of the Kansas Association of Teachers of Science (KATS) as President for the 2017 year (previously Vice President). Bonham first became involved with the organization when she was a student teacher and has opted to stay involved by being a regional representative. She is also and a member of the National Science Teachers Association. In addition to teaching for PCC, she teaches science courses for EduKan and was a high school science teacher before coming to PCC.

In years past Bonham has also received the award for Outstanding Rural Science Educator from State of Kansas, the EduKan Achievement of an Exceptional Rating from students and was a National Science Foundation grant recipient for Radiation and Man Workshop.

Bonham serves as the department chairperson for the math and science departments at PCC.

For being the recipient of the PHEA instructor of the year, Bonham received \$250 and plaque in her honor.



Campbell Receives Dennis Lesh Foundation Teacher Recognition Award

At Pratt Community College (PCC), each year a faculty member is awarded the Dennis Lesh Foundation Teacher Recognition Award based on nominations by PCC students, faculty, and staff. This year Dave Campbell, Electrical Power Technology (EPT) Instructor, won the prestigious award.

Many of Campbell's students submitted recommendations nominating him for the award. A consistent theme throughout the reasons for Campbell's nomination included his outstanding knowledge of the industry, and his caring attitude towards students' success as well as his willingness to go above and beyond to help students both in inside and outside of the classroom.



Fellow EPT instructor Jerry Haskell, who won the award last year, also spoke of Campbell's dedication to the EPT career, education, and students.

"His (Campbell) long hours of looking for better ways to teach young men how to succeed in the lineman industry has contributed into making the program what it is today," said Haskell.

Campbell believes students will be successful and learn better when you can have fun and create an environment where students want to learn.

"My teaching philosophy is to have fun with them," said Campbell. "To create an environment where they want to learn. That's half the battle. If they're having a good and they're learning at the same time then it's the best of both worlds. I enjoy showing them the things I wanted to know as a young lineman. The questions I wanted to know and couldn't get answered. I make sure that I teach them those things so they don't have to learn them the hard way."

Previous to coming to PCC in 2008, Campbell worked in the industry not only as a lineman but also as a safety and technical training instructor.

"I feel very honored," said Campbell. "There are a lot of great teachers here (PCC). It's a privilege to receive an award like this. I've enjoyed working at PCC these past nine years. It's great people and it's always interesting. Every day is a new adventure of some kind. The students are great and I've had some great classes over the years and they seem to just get better and better."

The Dennis Lesh foundation Teacher Recognition Award of \$1000 is awarded annually to a PCC teacher who is recognized as an excellent teacher, student advocate and exhibits general care and concern for the student body. The award is to be used to enhance the recipient's skills and abilities.

Linda Bolt Receives Dennis Lesh Foundation Food Services Award

Each year at Pratt Community College commencement a member of the staff in Food Services at the college is recognized for their continuing efforts to PCC's students.

This year, Great Western Dining employee, Linda Bolt, received the award announced at graduation for the second year in a row.

The Dennis Lesh foundation Food Services Recognition Award of \$500 is to be awarded to a Food Services employee who, by his or her actions, exhibits courtesy, care and concern for students and is known for the quality of service that he or she consistently provides them.

Bolt was nominated by PCC students and staff and selected by a committee in the Foundation.



Stewart and Cramer Say Farewell to PCC

Staff and Faculty at Pratt Community College came together to recognize the retirement of two faculty members on May 15. Agriculture Power Technology instructor, Rod Stewart, and Psychology and Sociology instructor, David Cramer, announced that they will be retiring at semester end.

"These two have more than four decades of teaching at PCC between them," said Dr. Michael Fitzpatrick, PCC Vice President of Instruction. "They will be missed by all of us here at PCC as well as the students they have taught over the years."

Stewart and Cramer said a few emotional words at the reception. Both agreed that working at PCC and with students each year has been wonderful.

"My time here has been extremely enjoyable," said Stewart. "I very much enjoyed working with the faculty. We've become like family."

Stewart started working at PCC 18 years ago. He says his greatest accomplishment is being a part of the team who established the Ag Power program and growing it into a program that is highly respected among Ag dealers and industry around the state. Because of the relationships made and the quality of the program all of the Ag power students each year are placed into semester internships and could possibly receive jobs at after completion.

Stewart says that over the years all of the experiences and students coming in and out make it all worthwhile.

"The best part of working here and with this program are all of the students and parents who stay connected with me," said Stewart. "I still get calls and letters from graduates. That is my greatest accomplishment."

Cramer also shared memorable moments of his 28 years at PCC. The Psychology and Sociology came to Pratt with just a small van filled with his family and possessions.

He began teaching in graduate school because he says he enjoys logic, evidence, and the pursuit of knowledge.

"Even though we are a small community college in a small rural area, we attract students from every state of the union as well as countries from all over the world," said Cramer. "We have athletes, vocational students, and academic students. What a pleasure it is to meet so many individuals and to have them contribute to each other's development. I truly enjoy the challenge of working in an institution which combines academics, athletics and skilled-labor curriculums. I am certain this is why PCC is consistently ranked at the top in the nation by outside evaluators."

Cramer told the crowd that two words can sum up the 28 years at PCC and for him those are gratitude and pride. Cramer said that he is thankful for the opportunity to come here and work with so many great people and students.

"I am very proud to have worked with so many wonderful people and the Pratt Community," said Cramer.

For their years of service Stewart received a Snap-On tool chest. Students and others contributed towards getting him the new tool chest.

Cramer received a gift card presented to him from Fitzpatrick.

"A little start towards your boat," said Fitzpatrick, jokingly.

Cramer joked that his long range plan is to buy a house in the mountains and another at the beach. He and his family plans on taking a summer vacation to the beach and will remain active and healthy in the Pratt community.

Stewart and his wife are preparing to move North of Manhattan, Kan. to be closer to his father who is 87-years-old and their children and grandchildren. Stewart also has an opportunity to do some workshops at Pittsburg State University.



Nursing student awarded Laura Betzen-Oeding Memorial Nursing Scholarship

Pratt Community College (PCC) student Kaitlyn (Katie) Millis was awarded the Laura Betzen-Oeding Memorial Nursing Scholarship at Commencement on Friday, May 12.

Millis, originally from Altamont, Kan., comes from a family of nurses including her mother and grandmother. That, along with what she saw and experienced from nurses taking care of her grandfather as he fought pancreatic cancer, helped her choose the nursing profession.

"That's what it's about- having such a deep compassion in caring for others that it truly does make a difference not only in their lives, but also in ours as a nurse and human being," said Millis.

After graduation, Millis plans on working to pass the NCLEX (National Council Licensure Examination) and then start a Bachelor of Nursing program in the fall, which the scholarship will help her accomplish. Eventually she has her sights set on continuing on with her education through a master's program and possibly a nurse practitioner program.

"To be a recipient of the Laura Betzen-Oeding Nursing Foundation scholarship is a tremendous honor," said Millis. "I feel that it so much more than a financial award. It is an honor to receive this award in Laura's name and I will strive to continue to honor the legacy that Laura had set forth."

This scholarship is given in memory of Laura Betzen-Oeding. Laura completed her nursing degree at Pratt Community College in 2000. She then continued her education at Wichita State University where she earned her BSN in 2002, and she was then a graduate student at Fort Hays State University in the Family Nurse Practitioner program. Laura's family and friends believe that she would have wanted the scholarship to go to a student who demonstrates a love for nursing, professionalism, and a kind, caring demeanor.

The scholarship is open to an ADN completion student at the Pratt campus, and the recipient is chosen by the Betzen and Oeding families and ADN nursing faculty. Further guidelines are that the student must have a minimum 2.5 GPA and be in their second year at PCC.

The PCC performing arts department will host 115 Pratt community kids, ages 4-11 for the production including camp alumni, sixth grade and up, as camp counselors and production techs.


The camp begins June 12 and ends on June 24 with their

PCC Instructor Traveling to Germany for Educational Seminar

A Pratt Community College instructor is trading in her beaver gear for lederhosen and traveling to Germany for a teacher's workshop during the summer. Education instructor, Rhonda Westerhaus, was selected, along with 19 other teachers across the United States, by the American Association of Teachers of German (AATG) to participate in a three week-long workshop that will take place in Leipzig, Germany.



In this workshop teachers will be developing classroom activities designed to incorporate technology, math and science as part of learning German in the classroom. The entire seminar will be conducted in German. In addition to observing classroom instruction, experiencing numerous workshops, and designing instructional materials, participants will visit the Deutsches Hygiene-Museum in Dresden and enjoy a two-day excursion to Wolfsburg for a hands-on experience with leaders in the German auto industry.

"I appreciate the support of Dr. Fitzpatrick who wrote a recommendation and the overall support of the college in this continuing education opportunity," said Westerhaus.

Westerhaus will be teaching a German Language class this fall both on-campus and online. The German I class on-campus will be held daily from 2:15 to 3:10 p.m. as well as being offered online through EduKan for distance learners. 
Community Leadership Program Graduates PCC Employee

PCC Track and Field Competes at the Region VI meet

On May 6, the Pratt Community College track and field team competed at the Region VI Championship hosted by Cowley County Community College in Arkansas City.

The weekend kicked off on Friday, Women's team started the weekend with the long jump. Adriauna Sirls took fifth overall to start things off for the women's team. Aaliyah Brown ran the 100m dash and took 10th with a time of 12.23. Tavaija Bennett Ran the fastest time for the girls in the 200m dash which also comes as a career best for her in a time of 26.26.

The men started the day with the 4x800m relay. The team of William Charles, Logan Krenn, Alex Viscarra, and Christain Collins ran a season best time of 8:27.37. Tyler Bailey ran the 100m dash for the boys and posted a 19th place finish with a time of 10.93. For the men Christopher McEnery posted the fastest time for the boys in a time of 21.92 taking 17th.

"Day one started off a little rough," PCC track coach Josh Harden said. "We had one bright spot in Sirls taking fifth in the long jump. I was hoping that some of the rough performances didn't set the tone for how the weekend was going to turn out for us, and it didn't."

The second day started with the women's 4x100m dash taking seventh with a time of 48.32. The team of Tavaija Bennett, Anysia Romain, Sirls, and Brown reached the national qualifying mark and a school record with their time. Madeline Jacobsen wrapped up the women's weekend running the 400m hurdles with a season and career best time of 1:11.09. Her time sets a new school record in the 400m hurdles.

Day two for the men's team opened up with the 400m dash. Clifford Porter ran a career best time with 48.64 to take 10th. McEnery followed just behind with a time of 48.87 to take 12th. Charles ran the 800m taking 10th with a career best time of 1:59.19. Justin Moore took 10th, as well, running the 5k in a time of 16:40.25. The final event on the track for the Beavers was the men's 4x400m relay. A team of Anthony Paul, Juvens Pierre, Porter, and McEnery, took sixth overall with a time of 3:18.11. That time qualifies them for national meet and just missed the school record by .01 seconds.

"Our second day was a major turnaround," Harden said. "We had a lot of good performances. We had a school record fall and a lot of personal records broken, which I'm extremely pleased with. The focus is to always perform at your best around this time of the season. We will be taking eight athletes to the national meet in two weeks. We are prepping for that and planning to make that our best performance of the year."

He closed out the season being selected as the conference player of the week, and he was selected first team All-Conference and first team All-Region VI. Stubbings was also honored by being named the Offensive Player of the Year in the KJCCC.
