Approximately 300 people attended the 29th Annual PCC Scholarship Auction which was held on April 7, 2017 at the 4-H building on the Pratt County Fairgrounds. The evening included dinner, raffles, games, silent auction, live auction, and a performance by PCC's vocal ensemble, Encore!.

According to Barry Fisher, Executive Director of Institutional Advancement and Alumni Relations, this was the most successful auction to date.

# Two Electrical Power Technology Students Awarded ITC scholarships

On Apr. 13, ITC Great Plains, LLC awarded scholarships to two students from the Electric Power Technology (EPT) program at Pratt Community College. EPT students Austin Showman and Kyle Hammer accepted the scholarships, which will help them complete their degree, in front of PCC staff and fellow students.

This is the fifth year ITC Great Plains has provided scholarships to EPT students at PCC. ITC Great Plains is a transmission-only utility based out of Topeka providing access to reliable, non-discriminatory, competitive, and low-cost energy in the fifteen state Southwest Power Pool region with a particular focus on Kansas and Oklahoma.

The President of ITC Great Plains, Brett Leopold, presented the scholarship check to Showman and Hammer.

"ITC has been wonderful to award scholarship money to our students and help give back. There are a lot of companies out there that are helping to provide power to the country but there aren't many of them that give back and try to help the next generation of employees and linemen coming into the system," said EPT instructor Dave Campbell.

When speaking about this year's scholarship recipients, Campbell mentioned how they really earned this opportunity and how much hard work and leadership they showed within the program.

Showman is from South Haven, Kan. and took a non-traditional approach through a couple other colleges before landing at PCC and really enjoying the EPT program and experiences.

"The main thing I have taken away from doing this (EPT), is doing the best work you can do," said Showman. "You're going to be as successful as what you put into it."

Showman will be interning this summer at Heartland Rural Electric Cooperative based out of Girard, Kan.

Hammer, born and raised in Rossville, Kan., chose the EPT program because of his interest and experience working with an electric company during the summers.

"The biggest things I have taken away from this program are pride, respect, and brotherhood," said Hammer. "Getting the lights back on is going to be something you take pride in."

In May, Hammer will be headed to FreeState Electric Cooperative out of Topeka, Kan for his internship.

Both Hammer and Showman hope to gain full-time employment while using the scholarship to finish up their last year of the EPT program.

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# Mark and Janae Melvin Named Outstanding Alumni of the Year

Pratt Community College Foundation has selected Mark and Janae (Stucky) Melvin as the 2017 Outstanding Alumni of the Year. The Outstanding Alumni of the Year award goes to alumni who have made contributions to career and community and was originally established in 1966.

"Instructional Council members conducted a thorough analysis of all alumni of the year nominees," said Dr. Michael Fitzpatrick, Vice President of Instruction. "Although they were impressed with the highly qualified candidates, they selected Mark and Janae based on the totality of their personal and professional accomplishments."

Mark and Janae both graduated from PCC in May 2000. Mark, a native of Newton, Kan., graduated with an associates of applied science in automotive technology degree while Janae, a Pratt native, earned an associate of arts degree in journalism. PCC holds a special place for Mark and Janae as it's where they met during freshman year. They quickly became friends after learning of a shared interest in music.

Mark and Janae were involved in multiple student organizations while at PCC. Mark was a member of Encore! and the Pep Band while Janae was editor-in-chief of the PCC newspaper, a student ambassador, member of Phi Theta Kappa, and even was the mascot Becky Beaver. Janae was also named Journalist of the Year for 2-year colleges by the Kansas Collegiate Media Association for her work at PCC.

Mark knows his time in the auto shop helped shape his a career path and allowed him to grow as a mechanic. Janae points to her time at PCC as when she learned a lot about teamwork and leadership as well as balancing deadlines and priorities. After graduation, Mark returned to Newton to work full-time and Janae transferred to Fort Hays State University to complete her four-year degree. They were engaged during her junior year and married a month after she graduated from FHSU in 2002.

While Janae worked on her graduate degree at Wichita State University, she received a public relations internship at the Las Vegas Motor Speedway. After relocating from Kansas to Las Vegas, Mark received a job at the Speedway as well as a truck driver and part-time mechanic at the Richard Petty Driving Experience (RPDE). Janae was hired to be the Director of Speedway Children Charities, just six months into her internship.

During their eight years in Las Vegas, Mark was promoted to full-time mechanic and then mechanical operations manager for RPDE. Janae left the speedway and returned to traditional public relations work in Las Vegas. She worked for two boutique firms and spent two years promoting food and beverage options for MGM Resorts International.

In 2013, the Melvin's had the opportunity to move back home to Kansas from Las Vegas. Mark was promoted to the Track Operations Manager at the Kansas Speedway. Since opening the full-time operations at the Kansas Speedway, Mark is overseeing one of the more successful locations for RPDE. He manages a staff of more than 20 employees in addition to overseeing the travel division of the company. Janae is the public relations and social media manager for Ottawa University, handling all the PR, social media and publications for OU's six campuses.

Currently, Mark and Janae live in Kansas City, Kan., with their two children, Logan (9) and Kennedy (5). Both are involved with their children's school activities and fundraisers through St. Patrick Catholic School.

"We have often said that if we could go back and relive anytime in our lives, it would be the two years we spent at PCC," said Janae. "This college has played a major role in our lives, both individually and as a couple. We are so blessed and honored to be the 2017 recipients of this award. And to be able to celebrate this accomplishment together makes it even more special."

# PCC Shooting Sports Team Takes Third in San Antonio Nationals

March 28 through April 2, five students from the Pratt Community College Shooting Sports team traveled to the National Collegiate Clay Target Championship in San Antonio, Texas to compete against 76 teams from all over the nation. PCC Shooting Sports came home with a Division 4 third place win.

This is the sixth year PCC has competed in the event against local, regional and national universities and community colleges and the first year that 2-year institutions had their own division. PCC placed third in Division 4 against other 2-year schools and is ranked first nationally as a 2-year institution in shotgun shooting sports.

The team took five shooters to compete, Tyler Skaggs, Travis Ledom, Addison Smith, Shania Hansen, and Seth Simmons. Skaggs took the lead in points for the team earning top marks in American Skeet, American Trap, International Skeet and Sporting Clays. While Smith was the best of her team in International Trap and Ledom lead in Five Stand.

“We would like to thank all faculty and staff for supporting us throughout the year and especially at nationals in San Antonio,” said Wildlife Instructor and Shooting Sports Coach Luke Laha. “While we’ve always held our own, placing in the top 1/3 nationally, it’s difficult to stand out in one massive division.”

The mission of the Pratt Community College Shooting Sports Club is to promote the safe handling of firearms, instill a lasting respect for the shooting sports, and provide the opportunity for members to improve their leadership and team building skills through a variety of training courses, competitions, and community service projects while enjoying the recreational and social benefits the shooting sports have to offer.



## PCC Student Receives KDB Scholarship



The Kappa Beta Delta (KBD) Honor Society has announced the 2017 recipients of Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP) Regions Merit Scholarships which includes one Pratt Community College business student.

Sophomore, Tyanna Hughes, was awarded a \$500 scholarship which she says she will use next year when she transfers to Central Methodist University in Missouri.

“I was very excited when I found out,” said Hughes. “The scholarship will be a big help next year.”

The ACBSP Regions Merit Scholarship is given on behalf of those ACBSP Regions that wish to participate. Each participating ACBSP Region designates and funds the amount of the scholarship. Hughes was chosen out of all Region 5 applicants. Region 5 consists of the ACBSP Midwestern Council of Business Schools and Programs representing colleges and universities in Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, and the Canadian Province of Manitoba.

Hughes chose the Accounting and Business program at PCC after a high school counselor advised her to look into accounting. Hughes says she has a knack for numbers.

Along with KBD, Hughes is also involved in the PCC Rodeo team as a barrel racer.

# PCC Puts ADN Program on Hold to Improve Test Passing Rates

Pratt Community College has put its Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) Program on hold for one year to allow faculty the opportunity to conduct a complete transformative restructuring of the ADN program starting with the mission and concluding with sustainable and repeatable measures to help ensure a high quality program in the future. PCC was granted approval by the Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN) on Mar. 29, to voluntarily cease admissions to the ADN Program for one academic year. Enrollment postponement for the program across all delivery modalities will occur for the 2017-2018 academic year.

With approval from KSBN, the ADN Program will resume August 2018 for the 2018-2019 academic year.



PCC is taking this action because the ADN program lost national accreditation through the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) in August 2015. Also at that time, KSBN lowered the program's status to conditional approval. Since then, significant action was taken by the college to increase admission standards, adjust course content, and assess program rigor; aligning delivery modalities, integrating the campus community, and mentoring. However, the ADN program has been unable to achieve expected student and program learning outcomes.

Subsequently in November 2016, KSBN conducted a Focused Site Visit in response to three consecutive years of deficient ADN National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) pass rates comparatively to the KSBN 75% benchmark. (2013: 56.16%/2014: 52.14%/ 2015: 66.94%). As of April 2017, the 2016 ADN-NCLEX annual pass rate is 31.25%.

For reasons that are unclear, students in the PCC program are not passing the exam the first time with only 31 percent of the class passing. That fails to meet the required 75 percent of the class passing required by the State Board of Nursing.

But when the students take the test again, the pass rate jumps to 85 percent.

However, the Board only looks at the first time taking the test numbers. For five years, the PCC students in the ADN program have not met that 75 percent pass rate and they were placed on a conditional status.

"Why the difference is unknown. The data is inconclusive. We just don't know why," Calvert said.

For the students that have already enrolled for next year's ADN Program, the staff is working with those students to find an alternate program. Some students may prefer to delay their entry and enroll in 2018.

Calvert said PCC had met with hospitals they work with that supply facilities for practical testing and they are on board with the college as they go through this evaluation.

The college also has a Practical Nurse program that has met and exceeded the required NCLEX pass rates so it will continue operations as normal.

The PN students also have to take the NCLEX. It's not as difficult as the ADN version but students understand what is required of them for the exam. Why the pass rates drop so dramatically for the ADN program tests is a mystery since they know what is coming, Calvert said.

Also unknown is why the pass rates for on-line students, a dramatic drop from 77.8 percent in 2014-2015 to just 16.7 percent in 2015-2016.

The PCC nursing program, both the ADN and PN programs, had been exemplary for many years but the expansion of the program lead to a big turnover of 60 faculty members and seven directors over a five year period. During that time, the problems with ADN passing rates continuously failed to meet the 75 percent pass rates on the first time taking the test. During the same time period, the PN program continuously met and exceeded the 75 percent pass rate.

PCC administration and nursing staff are now on the path to provide clearly defined, measurable, and assessable goals, objectives and benchmarks will be established and evaluated weekly, monthly, and quarterly to help ensure ADN faculty are meeting administrative expectations during

this transformational period. In addition, the ADN faculty will submit an action plan timeline for tracking progress.

A Strategic Communication Plan will include timely updates to stakeholders, including KSBN, regional medical providers, Board of Trustees and internal PCC constituencies throughout the review process.

Since the first graduating class in 1984, PCC's ADN Program had exemplar NCLEX pass rates and was considered a premier provider of healthcare professionals in the state. The solvency, stability, and sustainability of maintaining programmatic excellence began to erode around 2012 when a myriad of factors drastically changed the size, scope, and quality of graduates.

The increase of program capacity to 180 students across face-to-face, multi-campus, and online created an un-scalable growth model resulting in continuous turnover. Since 2012, turnover included 60 faculty members and 7 Directors over a five-year period.

PCC is committed to delivering quality academic programs and services to students and stakeholders. The Board of Trustees and administration are driven to restore quality to the ADN Program. The Board of Trustees was recognized by KSBN for their dedication and support of nursing education during this challenging time.

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## PCC Hires New Ag Power Instructor

*In April of 2017, Pratt Community College hired Steven McKennon as Agriculture Power instructor to take over for retiring instructor, Rod Stewart. When both men were asked about the transition and change, they likened it to the passing of the "wrench."*

*"He'll (McKennon) do a tremendous job and he's the right man for the job," said Stewart.*

*"Rod does so much," said McKennon. "He's been here for 18 years. I have a lot of respect for him."*

*McKennon comes to PCC with a wealth of agricultural industry knowledge and experience. Not only is McKennon a PCC graduate, he also brings 14 years of industry experience to the program. He understands how vital hands-on experience is and is confident in the support from area dealers to provide students with the best possible experience.*

*Most of the program details will stay the same including the traditional eight week class and internship set up as well as the small engine repair class which allows students to work on lawnmowers for the community. With a solid curriculum already, McKennon is looking to take small steps to continue to grow and move the program forward as the industry advances.*

*"My personal goal is to update the program to fit the demands of the new age of farm equipment," said McKennon. "Technicians today need to come out of a trade school with the knowledge, skills and ability to properly diagnose the basic electronic systems on equipment as well as understand the theory of hydraulics, theory of basic engine operation and have a grasp of the integrated solutions area that is growing rapidly. The program will provide adequate training in all of these areas at a level that will be sufficient for the workforce."*

*"Prospective students can be assured the APT program will be challenging and fun at the same time," said McKennon. "Any person that has the desire to work with their hands and make a difference in the farming and industrial technical fields needs to be encouraged to pursue the Associate's Degree tied to this program."*

# John Ishee Hired as New Head Women's Basketball Coach at PCC

Pratt Community College Director of Athletics Bill Wilson announced today the hiring of John Ishee as the Beavers new head women's basketball coach. Ishee brings to Pratt a wealth of experience as a basketball coach that spans over 25 years.

"We are very excited to have John Ishee join the PCC family as our next head women's basketball coach," Bill Wilson said. "John brings a great deal of coaching experience to Pratt as well as recruiting ties to Kansas, as well as all over the country. He has coached at many levels of women's college basketball and understands what it's going to take to build our program. We are excited for what the future holds for the Beavers."

Ishee comes to PCC from his hometown of Gulfport, Mississippi where he has spent the last couple of years caring for his ailing mother. While in Gulfport he assisted Coach Donny Fuller at Gulfport High School. During his time at Gulfport High, the Lady Admirals won 34 games and advanced to two consecutive south state tournaments.

"I am ecstatic about the opportunity to be the next head women's basketball coach at Pratt Community College," Ishee said. "I would like to thank my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, the College Board, President Dr. Mike Calvert, athletic director Bill Wilson, Coach Max Good, and the selection committee for their belief in me."



Prior to being at Gulfport High School, Coach Ishee coached college basketball for 25 years. During that time he participated in nine national tournaments including five NCAA tournaments. Ishee had stops at the University of Mississippi, Southern Mississippi, St. Louis University, McNeese State, Pacific, and New Mexico State. Ishee spent five years as the head coach at Southeast Missouri State from 2006 through 2011. While at Southeast Missouri State his teams won back to back Ohio Valley Conference championships. He was recognized as the OVC coach of the year in 2007. During his career, Ishee recruited and coached numerous all-conference selections highlighted by four players that played in the WNBA.

Ishee credits all the players, countless colleagues and notable Southern Miss coaches M.K. Turk, Kay James, Paul Duke, current Newman University coach Darin Spence, and the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley legendary coach Larry Tidwell for shaping his coaching identity.

"The last three years out of college women's basketball have been difficult but rewarding for me," Coach Ishee said. "Helping care for mom and eventually losing her to Heaven has been very, very tough. However, I'm now eager as a Beaver to return to doing what I love. Getting to do it in the state where the game was invented is simply awesome. With the support of the administration, the wonderful community of Pratt, and most importantly, the young women that will represent us, we will win in the classroom, in the community, and on the court.
