In September, Pratt Community College was named one of the Top Ten Community Colleges in the Country by SmartAsset.com. The company evaluated approximately 700 public community colleges across the country in order to find the best investment in terms of a low cost education, good return on investment and high success rate

Pratt Community College graduates make 22.8 percent more than their college expenses as a starting salary, and has a 54 percent graduation and transfer rate.

WOO Students Travel to Cedar Bluff



PCC's Wildlife Outfitting & Operations sophomores recently traveled to Cedar Bluff Reservoir, in northwest Kansas, to put what they learned in the classroom to use.

The students corralled geese on a pond by

the wildlife area office into a pin so that they could pull the geese's primary feathers and band them.

Primary feathers, also known as the wing tips, are pulled so they can't fly for approximately eight weeks. After the students pulled the feathers, they gave them to a biologist who looked at the sex and age and then banded the animal. Then when one of the birds is then shot, they can call in the band number for biologists to know where the animal was banded and its migration route, which helps set the bird's hunting season and helps determine the four waterfowl flyways.

"This is a good experience for students to see one of the many projects that Wildlife and Parks and biologists do each year," said Program Instructor Luke Laha. "We talk about bands in waterfowl management class so it's great for them to be able to see it and be involved."



Electrical Power Lineman Alumni Return for Training

The annual Kansas Electric Cooperative Hotline School was held on Sept. 9-11 at Pratt Community College, and of the 40 participants from Kansas and Nebraska, many of them are PCC alumni.

"I remember watching this as a student and thinking that I just wanted to be involved and up in the bucket doing it," said Zane May, who graduated in 2011 and is now at Pioneer Electric out of Ulysses, Kan.

The training allows individuals to receive hands-on training while refreshing their skills. As part of their training, the men work on the lines as if they had electricity running to them. Working with others and passing on their knowledge is very important and is helpful to all who attend, said Dave Campbell, EPT program coordinator.

"This is great not only for the linemen that are out in the field, but also for my guys," Campbell said. "It gives them a chance to rotate with the lineman and observe what they are doing and learn different techniques."

May said that while it is more fun to be up working on the wires, than down below observing, he felt it was a good experience, along with his training at PCC.

"While in college I learned how to climb and the fundamentals, which were what I needed to know to get a job," he said. "I felt equipped for the real world, when I started my internship."

After his freshman year, May had an internship at Pioneer and finished his degree online so he could continue working there when they had a job open up as his internship was ending.

"The job is a lot of hard work but I love it," May said. "If the students are willing to work hard, they will do well."

PCC Administrator Selected as Peer Reviewer

Lisa Perez Miller, Vice President of Students/Enrollment Management at Pratt Community College has been selected to serve The Higher Learning Commission as a new member of its Peer Corps.

The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools oversees the accreditation of degree-granting colleges and universities in 19 Midwestern and South-Central states, including Kansas.

The Commission relies upon the work of peer reviewers for its accrediting activities. These volunteers generously share their knowledge and experience to assure and advance institutional quality. The Commission maintains a Peer Review Corps of approximately 1,500 faculty and administrators from institutions within the North Central region.

Peer Reviewers evaluate member institutions for adherence to the Commission's Criteria for Accreditation. In addition, they offer consultative feedback that contributes to the quality of an institution's processes and academic offerings.

Peer Reviewers must have at least five years of experience in higher education, a master's degree or other appropriate terminal degree, and be currently employed by or recently retired from an institution accredited by the Higher Learning Commission



Peer review entails bringing judgment based on experience and knowledge to the evaluation process. In all evaluation processes, judgment, reason, and the documentation of evidence contribute to effective peer review. Effective judgment of the Criteria for Accreditation requires that any evaluation be informed significantly by the context of the institution being evaluated and its mission. The review process requires examination of submitted materials, participation in an evaluation

(on ground or online) and report writing.

Miller will participate in a New Peer Corps member's comprehensive training sessions on Oct. 1 - 3 at the Q Center in St. Charles, Ill.
